INTERESTING ADDRESS.—Last evening in the Baptist Church school room an interesting address was delivered by Mr. J.E.B. Mr. MacCreedy gave an outline of the history of newspaper work, going back to the time of the Romans, several centuries before Christ, when the daily activities were written out in what was called the Acta Diurna. The next oldest paper of which there is an authentic record was the Pekin Gazette, which was first issued 671 years ago. The first newspaper printed in England, the speaker went on to explain, was established by Sir Roger L'Estreange in 1663 W. G. Sutherland.
