Richard Leads Habs To 4-1 Victory In Toronto; Bruins, Red Wings Win

TORONTO, Jan. 19 (CP)—Hockey's rocket, Maurice Richard, exploded tonight and led Montreal Canadiens to a 4-1 victory over their arch rivals, Toronto Maple Leafs. So disappointed were the 14,347 fans that they cheered the Habtants, a strange sound in Maple Leaf Gardens.

Both clubs played without one regular performer. Montreal's Ken Reardon and Toronto's Cal Gardner were on the side lines, having been suspended for tonight's contest as a result of a stick swinging duel the pair staged the last time the teams met here.

The two City League hockey clubs of Saint Dunstan's and Navy really put on a smart exhibition of hockey in their league game on Tuesday night at the Forum.

Playing one of the lowest scoring games so far this year and producing the first scoreless opening period, both teams hit a rapid pace all through the game, which displayed plenty of smart teamwork all along the line and lacked nothing in the way of excitement, good offensive and defensive play and thrilling breakaways.

Some smart goaltending by both Davis and Strain was also a big feature of the game, with the latter in particular making some sensational saves in the third period when the Navy continually hammered away in and around the Saints cage. A local spectator, discussing Strain's performance, affixed the situation when he said "Strain is either awfully good or awfully lucky" and this column is of the opinion that he definitely fits in the former category.

Despite the fact that the Navy were on the short end of the 3-2 decision, the squad showed a definite improvement in their style of play under the capable coaching of Walter Lawlor, who is now handling the team. His appropriate shifting of Art Perry back on the defence, where he can be utilized effectively in breaking up fast opposing forward attacks and also can capitalize on a fast open break himself, added considerable to the strength of the team and nearly paid off in goals on several occasions.

Coach A. J. McAdam who was handling the Saints from the boards in Jackie Kane's absence had a few changes in his lineup as well which worked very effectively. He moved Cart MacDonald up to centre between Houde and Rodgers, and at the same time moved Joe Mahar back on the defence with Mike Hennessey. The addition of Farmer to the lineup also paid off for the Saints when he tallied their second goal of the night. Farmer, who played with the Saints last season, has been playing all All Stars, but on resuming his studies at the University recently has lined up again with his former teammates.

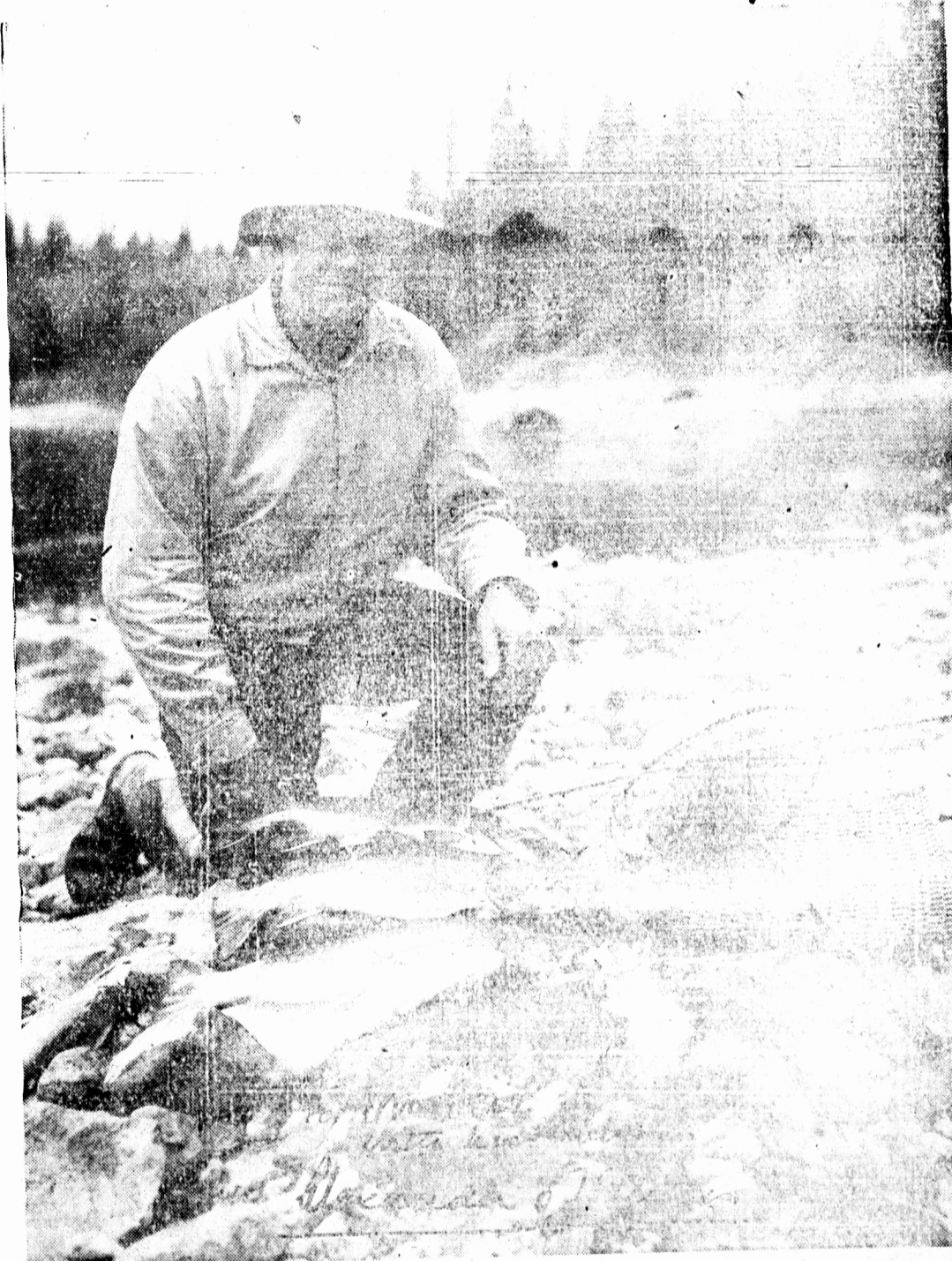

"Government House, Ottawa, January 12, 1949

"Dear Mr. Weir: I am sending you a photograph which you may like to have, taken when I was fishing in the Limestone River in Montserrat last fall. You will notice that nice little red you made me, and what it has done to the fish!

It will be recalled that on the occasion of the Vice Royal visit to Prince Edward Island last summer, the Governor General was presented by Mr. Weir with a beautiful hand-crafted fishing rod. His Excellency promised to give the donor the first trout he caught with it on the Island. Unfortunately "fishermen's luck" was against him, and the trout did not materialize. As indicated by His Excellency's letter, however, the rod was highly appreciated and was used effectively on a subsequent fishing holiday in Montserrat. The autographed picture shown in the picture would satisfy any disciple of James Watson, and from his smiling appearance it is evident that His Excellency is proud of his catch.

His kindly note of appreciation is naturally very much appreciated by Mr. Weir, who was also remembered with a Christmas Card from the Governor General a few weeks ago.
