The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening. The teachers' reports showed the enrollment for the past month to be 1115, the average attendance 930, and the percentage 92.1. There were 181 cases of tardiness and one case of truancy. The number of visits made by teachers to parents was 135. Number of notices sent 91. There were nine cases of corporal punishment, 23 fell below average in their grades and 40 pupils got permission to leave school before the hour of closing. The highest percentage of attendance made was 98. Three teachers reported no case of tardiness during the month. The schools will close for Christmas holidays on the 24th, instant and reopen on Monday the 4th proximo. Certificates were read stating that the boilers and heating systems were examined, and being tested by hydrostatic pressure were safe for working pressure carried viz. about forty pounds to the square inch in Prince Street and West Kent Schools and sixty pounds in Queen Street School. After passing some bills the meeting adjourned.
