In Memoriam

MR. JOSEPH DOUCETTE

On Friday, Sept. 15th, 1939, at his home 42 1/2 Upper Queen Street, Charlottetown, there passed away Mr. Joseph Doucette in the 80th year of his age.

He was a Mr. Doucette, who had retired from active duties a few years ago, had enjoyed comparatively good health until last April when the very sudden death of his beloved wife was a great shock to him. Since then he had gradually pined away so that his death was not unexpected. During his illness he was frequently visited and comforted by the priests of the Holy Redeemer parish in the North End, the Last Sacraments of the Catholic Church, he quietly and peacefully passed away.

The deceased, who was a son of the late Moses Doucette and Margaret Blais, was born at Pictou, N.S. He married Sylvia Doucette, daughter of Joseph Doucette and Judith Gallant on November 27, 1863. They enjoyed a long and happy married life, having celebrated the 55th anniversary of their wedding last December.

The earlier years of their married life were spent at Oyster Bed Bridges, where Mr. Doucette was employed as a cooper. He later engaged in the shipping business then carried on by the late Donald MacKay, who for many years represented the Second District of Queen's in the Provincial Legislature. Thirty years ago the family removed to Charlottetown, where Mr. Doucette became a valued employee of the firm of L. M. Poole and Company, in which capacity he gave most faithful service and made a host of friends.

The late Mr. Doucette was a man of very quiet and kindly disposition. Of him it could be truly said that to know him was to like him. In his family life he was a devoted husband and father whose every thought and care was the welfare of all. He has left to his family and his friends an inspiration in well-doing which they will ever cherish.

The following are left to mourn his passing: Six sons, Henry, Wilfred, Leo and Eugene of this city, Isidore of Montreal, and Francis of Hunter River; two daughters, Agnes (Sister St. Eric of the Congregation of Notre Dame of Montreal), and Helen (Mrs. J. A. Peters of Cape Breton); also seven grandchildren. One son and two daughters predeceased him. Of a large family of brothers and sisters only two remain, Mrs. Bruno Martin of Hunter River and Melaine of this city.

Sunday Is "Father's Day"
 — In Britain Now —

LONDON, Oct. 25—Sundays are reunion days among London's evacuated families.

In fact, they might almost be called "Father's Day" for the great majority of the husbands who leave London to visit the towns and villages around every week end are the men whose wives and families had left home at the start of the war.

The trains leaving London's main stations are crowded with fathers, uncles, aunts, big brothers and sisters, and, sometimes, mothers who stayed at home when their children went away.

Large crowds arrive at the High Wycombe station and from there spread themselves all over the outlying villages between the outcrops and farms where the children are staying.

There are more crowds at Chessham, Amersham, Reading and other towns.

Village commons and lanes are populated as never before, and the round families spend most of their time in the open air.

NEW WONDERS

The children are almost inebriated with the new wonders they discover—blackberries, cows and the duck ponds—all of which father has to be shown.

London families make some sacrifice to pay their fares. At Widmore End (Bucks) one father, a laborer, having lunch with his family by the roadside, said he came from Paddington.

"Our train was filled with perennials," he said, "and four miles here from High Wycombe station and had a job to find the place."

Another man who came to see his family searched on foot all morning before he found the village where they are living.

At Holmer Green some of the fathers had walked miles.

FOSTER PARENTS

"They have walked and begged lifts in lorries," one of the voluntary workers said. "Others came early by bus and some cycled from London."

There has been some slight trouble in some of the areas and an evacuation officer summarized the main complaints under these heads:

Temporarily sleeping on the floor on mattresses.

Oil stoves which the women do not understand.

Distance from the shops.

Difficult cooking arrangements.

Quiet of the country.

The breaking up of the family.

"A few have returned but most are settling down," said the officer.

British Youth Train Eagerly For Air Force

RECRUITS STUDY AT INITIAL TRAINING SCHOOLS TO TAKE THEIR PLACES IN THE FIGHTING SQUADRONS OF THE CLOUDS.

LONDON, Oct. 25—(CP)—At a Royal Air Force Initial Training Wing "somewhere on the coast" an undetermined number of eager young men with the early characteristics of air navigation, gunnery, bombing, Morse code and the theory of flight.

Newspapermen who visited the "secret" school found a host of youngsters working at desks in an abandoned amusement pavilion surrounded by disused slot machines and other such adjuncts of what is called in this country a "corky fair."

They are one of the many primary classes for the enlarged Air Force, youths who will some day fight the Empire's air battles, defend coasts and trade routes, or bomb the enemy in his own country.

For a few weeks they are here for their elementary instruction, to acquire disciplinary habits and to toughen their bodies. Most of them, between 18 and 25 years of age, are in good physical shape already, but they get compulsory physical perks anyway. Then, if they want to, they can play soccer, squash, tennis, cricket and baseball.

Most Englishmen look funny playing baseball, but it is a new game to them, although one which doesn't take too long to play, and they are gradually getting used to it.

When they aren't playing games or diving into the school's fine swimming pool which once stood to the equals of holidaying cuties, they are slugging at their desks or undergoing flying tests in "Link Trainers"

Piloting Around

The Link Trainer looks like a small section of airplane fuselage, just the piece around the pilot's seat. It is fitted with controls and can be maneuvered like a plane, except that it doesn't leave where it is and is never more than about five feet off the ground.

Break Light Land Plane Flight Mark

MUNCIE, Ind., Oct. 23—(AP)—Bewhiskered, leg weary Robert A. McDaniels, 25, of Muncie, and Kelvin F. Baxter, 23, of nearby Richmond, brought their monoplane to a bumpy landing at 6:38 p. m. CST (8:38 p. m. AST) today, establishing a new light land airplane endurance record of 535 hours and 45 minutes.

The Hoosier fliers bettered the 345-hour mark established this summer by the Decatur, Ill., brothers, Humphrey and Hunter Moody, at Springfield, Ill., but were more than 100 hours short of the world's aircraft endurance record of 653 hours and 30 minutes set in 1935 by Fred and Al Keys of Meridian, Miss.

Baxter and McDaniels claim their mark will stand for light land planes. They contend Wes Carroll and Clyde Schlieppert of Long Beach Calif., who still are in the air with approximately 46 hours more flying time, will have a record for seaplanes since their ship is equipped with pontoons.

Both the fliers, who had been in the air since 10:53 a. m. Oct. 1, were stiff from the long confinement in their 1,100-pound 55-horsepower cabin plane.

Cause for the landing, Earl Luker chief of the ground crew speaking for the fliers said, "extreme leg fatigue." He said McDaniels and Baxter told him their legs "had gotten so weak and stiff" it was difficult for them to "move the rudder bar."

We're glad to get down," McDaniels and Baxter chorused. "They said the light, second of the summer for them, was 'just fun at first—then it got to be pretty hard work.'"

Buffalo In Ontario

At the request of the Ontario Government, a car load of twenty buffalo has been shipped to Burwash, Ontario, by the National Parks Bureau of the Department of Mines and Resources.

The nucleus herd now being transferred to Ontario comes from Elk Island National Park in Alberta. Buffalo are not native to the Province of Ontario, and so their introduction to the Burwash area is an experiment in the acclimatization of this species of big game. Some years ago elk from Western Canada were transferred to Ontario game preserves, and the success which attended this venture has no doubt led the province to endeavour to add the buffalo to its list of big game mammals.

Once faced with possible extinction, large herds of buffalo and elk now roam in parks and reserves in Western Canada. Canada's success in preserving them is a noteworthy example of the value of timely conservation.

CHIVALRY DEAD?

TORONTO, Oct. 24—Chivalry in Canada—the Toronto brand anyway—is dead. That's the consensus of a group of touring British school girls, stranded here because of war conditions.
