—MISSING SHIP Presumed Lost VANCOUVER, Aug. 24 (CP)—The B.C. Star, R.C.A.F. vessel with 16 men on board, missing since July 23 when it sailed from northern British Columbia, must now be presumed lost with all hands, according to a report received here today. The announcement said that fate of the vessel had been sealed by the discovery of two bodies and two life rafts from the craft.

Western air command said apparently disaster overtook the vessel in Queen Charlotte Sound between Vancouver Island and the Queen Charlotte Islands. Articles of clothing recovered did not allow personal identification beyond establishing that they were R.C.A.F. men who were aboard the B.C. Star.

The 70-foot vessel was wireless-equipped, but observed silence in certain coastal areas under war regulations. Complete safety equipment of approved standard was on board, including life boat and rafts.

The vessel was carrying a 42-ton cargo, mainly building materials, and cargo capacity was 80 tons. R.C.A.F. officials stated that weather conditions in the area were good at the time the ship disappeared. Search for clues which might bring up the mystery will be continued.

Annual C. W. L. Convention Opened At Miscouche Yesterday

Popes have always taught clearly the nature of the rights and duties of the Christian family and the part the women play in maintaining this essential order. The sphere of women's activities does extend beyond the home but when she marries she takes upon herself new responsibilities and duties.

A mothers place is not in industry but in her home. And here she should be the most active force of her country. The home is the cradle of all vocations and of true Christian citizenship. Therefore members of this society would do well to study the papal attitudes towards the family and family life.

The speaker then addressed the subject he had chosen to address them on was the Christian family and the members of the League should be all their social encyclicals on the importance of the family in a well ordered society. He pointed out that
