Mrs. A. A. McCaul, Ellerslie, has received a letter from her aunt in the United States stating that her grand-father, the late Nathaniel Strand, had left property to his heirs, which has not been looked after, of which Mrs. Thomas Reeves, Lower Freetown, is one.

On Saturday afternoon a searching party procured a boat, and went across the river to the Rosebank side, where, it had been claimed, that something resembling a body had been observed, supposedly that of Daniel Plaisted, who was recently drowned. The party returned shortly after without finding anything.

The postponed meeting of the S. D. C. Mock Parliament was held on March 4th at 7.30 p. m. The adjourned debate on Hon. Owen Kiggins Resolution re-Maritime Representation was resumed by Hon. S. J. McDonald who expressed himself with all his old time vigor. He dwelt chiefly on the question of representation by population which was raised by the Opposition and proved that this principle is not applicable in all cases. J. E. Gillis (North Toronto) spoke at great length against the Resolution. He dealt effectively with the argument of representation and declared in a spirit of lofty patriotism that the sacredness and inviolability of the compact entered into by the provinces must not be broken except by the mutual consent of those provinces. The word readjusted was not used by mistake by the leaders of the upper provinces for the same word was used in the case of every other province except British Columbia. The Premier whose recent indisposition has prevented him from attending the House for some time past, was in his place and replied to the arguments of the preceding speaker. Shortly before the House rose a dramatic scene occurred. The ministry resigned office and the curtain rang down on the Government party after a highly honorable and useful career.
