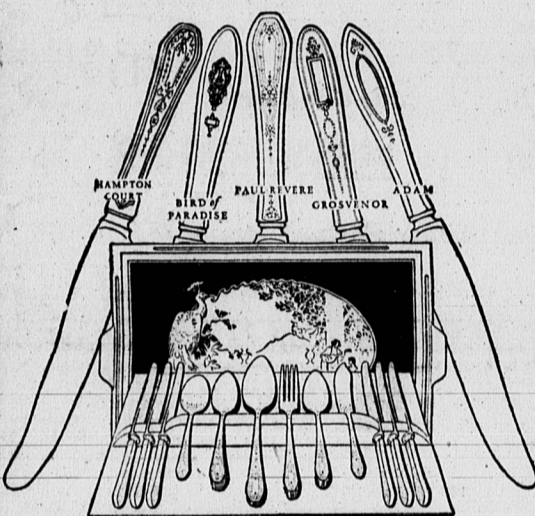

## CURIOSITY OF LIFE

### BIG THINGS PREY ON SMALL

### ON THE SEA AND LAND

### Historical.

One of the curiosities of life is that in every division of the creature of this terrestrial sphere, the larger things of life prey on the small, we might almost say exist by this propensity to crush its own species as well as others. In trade and commerce the great magnates are prone to pursue this heartless method of accumulating unnecessary wealth at the expense of the poor, even to the extent of taking their lives. This is an extreme view held by the victims of Capital, but the tyrants who draw the very life-blood of the toilers can scarcely justify their actions in the face of their indifference to the cry of the victims. In every instance a reason is given for those practices many of which are reasonable; in others there is none except the greed of self, which prompts the big fish of the sea to prey on the small ones, to appease its hunger and the savage pursuit of the timber wolf that feels the gnawings of hunger and follows the scent of the trapper for days to capture the means of satisfying it.

Possibly it may be held that these are extreme views, but some writers go farther in discussing the subject. For instance we quote one writer who says:—

### Extirmination.

"The desire to exterminate insect, bird and animal life, seems to be inherent in human nature. The housewife has a mania for exterminating rats, mice, fleas, bedbugs, and other insects. The hunter is engaged in a continuous effort to exterminate the birds and animals of the forest, and they usually kill everything in sight, whether good for food or not.

"The trapper is engaged in wholesale destruction of the fur-bearing animals to please the fastidious tastes of women who think more about appearance than humane treatment of the animals, and incidentally he makes a little money. The sportsman takes game and fish at wholesale and his work of destruction spells extermination sooner or later.

"The fisherman is working hard for extermination of fish without any thought of the needs of future generations. The salmon net fisherman would take the last salmon socking the way to the spawning ground to propagate its kind; the lobster packers would take the last baby lobster left at the bottom of the sea.

"The big fish corporation, with its steam trawlers, sweeps the ocean, gathering in everything in the shape of fish life and incidentally despoiling the feeding grounds for the sake of immediate gain. Their work has already spelled 'extermination' of the inshore fisheries, and, unless stopped, will eventually exterminate them from the sea.

"The pulp makers are destroying vast tracts of forest to enable the big daily papers to print, 32, 48 and 64 pages, when 8 pages would hold all that they print worth reading.

"Militarism is preparing to slaughter human beings on a larger scale than ever, and, if the war mongers have their way the best of the human race and so-called 'civilization' will be exterminated.

"Women are engaging in men's pursuits and entering into public life to such an extent that, even the home is threatened with eventual extermination. Here and there a few people are striving to stem the tide of human activity which is rushing madly on toward extermination, but, as a rule, they are looked upon as old fogies living in the 'muddy past'.

Another critic touches upon the same topic and finds corroborative evidence in the following opinions, viz:—

### The Steam Trawler Should Go.

"It appears to be generally recognized that by far the most important recommendation made by the Fisheries Commission is the total prohibition of steam trawlers operating from Canadian ports, and that it is a question as to whether the shore fisheries or the steam trawler shall survive.

"Before the Commission was appointed or thought of, the Press urged this as the thing needed to save the shore fisheries. The steam trawler is usually owned by wealthy individuals and companies who never operated a hand line or caught a codfish, and they have practically destroyed the inshore fisheries upon which thousands of hardy fishermen along our coast depended to make a living for themselves and their families. This fishing was their birthright, and no argument can justify capitalists being permitted to send out steam boats with huge nets to take it from them.

"The proposal for an international conference is all right, but let Canada act first to protect her shore fishermen and then we would be in a strong position at a conference such as is proposed.

"What is the use of talking about co-operation in the handling and marketing of their fish to the fishermen when they can get scarcely any fish to market by hand lining, owing to the operation of the trawlers. Of course, the fishermen (?) who own the trawlers will put up a strong case from the standpoint of their own profits, but they should be asked to show how the shore fisherman is going to exist while they pay him starvation prices for the few fish he can get on the one hand and scoop up the cream of them with their

trawlers and sell them at high prices on the other. The chairman dissented from the trawler recommendation, but this was to be expected."

"Those who are old enough to look back over 60 or 70 years of the history of the fisheries industry on the coast of our Island will testify that no sooner was fishing with trawlers outside the three-mile limit and with seines inside the three-mile limit permitted than the depletion of our fishing grounds became a failure. The trawler never could do any more than touch the fringe of the inshore fisheries, but the effects of their operation outside rapidly spelled disaster inside.

"This is a page of history that should draw the inshore fishermen into line with the anti-trawlers inside in the making of regulations for both.

LONDON, May 19. — An Earl's sister is among the five women successful candidates in the list of examination for the Bar conducted by the Council of Legal Education. She is Lady Ankaret Cecelia Carolyn Jackson, a younger sister of the Earl of Carlisle and wife of William Jackson, a barrister. She will be called to the Bar shortly and hopes to practice in the courts. She took up the law as a profession some years ago and continued her studies after marriage.

Miss Sophy Sanger, who acted for five years as chief of a section of the International Labor Office of the League of Nations at Geneva, has also passed her "finals". Miss Sanger is an expert on the Labor laws of the different nations, and she will probably specialize in this subject. She has written a section of the new Encyclopaedia Britannica.

Other successful candidates are Miss Harriet Elizabeth Valtzy, of Cornwall Gardens, Kensington, who is only 21; Miss Louise Beryl Cruikshank and Miss Marie Angela Carrver. In all 20 women were successful.
