HEALTH OF ANIMALS BRANCH

Under and by virtue of the authority conferred upon me by the provisions of section eighty-one of the Order-in-Council of November third, nineteen hundred and nine, being regulations relating to animals' quarantine, issued under authority of Chapter eleven, 3 Edward Seventh, intitled "An Act respecting infectious and contagious diseases affecting animals," I hereby authorize and direct the inspection by veterinary inspectors of all foxes entering the Province of Prince Edward Island, Consignors and Consignees of foxes brought into said Island shall, on or before the arrival of said foxes in said Island, report the number and description of the same to the nearest Customs officer, and shall submit the same for veterinary inspection at Charlottetown. After satisfactory inspection, foxes will be placed in quarantine for thirty days in the premises provided for the purpose by the Provincial Government. During the period of detention, the necessary care and attention will be provided by the Provincial Government, and the foxes will be at the risk of the owners. The Order of July thirtieth, nineteen hundred and thirteen, is hereby rescinded.
