Maritime W. B. M. U. OF PERSONAL INTEREST

(continued from third page)

Wednesday evening was devoted to a plea from meeting in the interests of Missions. Opened with devotional exercises participated in Mrs. Clark of Fredericton and Mrs. Nalder of Windsor. The first speaker was Mrs. Ira M. Smith whose subject was Home Missions. She dealt principally with some of the reasons urged against Home Missions as compared with Foreign Missions viz: supporting a small church in some rural district is considered by some a needless expense. In answer to that let it be known that these little churches are not kept alive what is to become of the principles which are dear to us as a denomination! If we as Baptists fail to teach them it is not in the nature of things to expect them to be taught at all. Again from these little obscure churches come some of our ablest and strongest men, men who fill some of the foremost positions in our cities with credit to themselves. Look at the great Northwest, our own fair homeland. People from every nation are flocking into Canada and it is our duty to give them the Gospel. Ours is the opportunity.

Solo "What of the Home" was beautifully rendered by Miss Hatch of Wolfville. The next speaker was Mrs. I. C. Archibald one of our returned missionaries. Her subject was the Foreign Field. In her own inevitable manner our sister held the attention of the audience as she showed that God's promises dependent upon the fulfillment of certain conditions. Abraham was called of God and to him were given certain promises based on certain conditions. These conditions were not fulfilled and the result is that the Israelites instead of possessing the promised land are scattered over the face of the earth. There are giants in the land to-day and the church of God is afraid of them. "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature in Christ's last command. Some who call themselves God's people tell us that somehow in the great love and mercy of God the heathen will be saved whether we send them the Gospel or not. This is one of the giants abroad to-day. Another giant is the fear of the expense of missions.

We need this autumn on our Foreign field three mission families, one for the Savaras, one for a new station adjoining Tekall, and one to go to the assistance of Mr. Sanford at Vizianagram. Are we asking too much of the church of God when we ask for these three families? Take God's word for the answer He has given to His Church the great commission. His people are stewards of the manifold grace of God. Are we going to be faithful to Christ who gave himself for a lost world. In the famine of '98 and '99, in one county in India 10,000 people starved to death, although enough food for them was stored in a granary owned by one man who was surely not a good steward of what was in his possession. Let us not be like that man unfaithful stewards of the Bread of Life.

The next address was given by Rev. L. D. Morse another of our missionaries on furlough. Mr. Morse said he did not intend to spend much time describing the country to which he expects to return this autumn. Listening to Mrs. Archibald had led his mind back to India with its thousands of mud huts and the more stately residences of the higher classes. India is no imaginary land. This but a black spot on the map but one village in India may be compared to the stars of Heaven though the stars may be very bright ones. We need no eloquent speeches to enlist our sympathies, what we need is the will to do as we are told which is simply serving God. None of us like sham. Christ says "Why call ye me Lord and do not the things which I say". We call ourselves the servants of God, are we or are we not? To serve the Lord is simply to do his will. Christ willeth not the death of one sinner. Are we doing His will unless we strive to the utmost of our ability to give the Gospel to the perishing millions in India. When God called Moses to lead the children of Israel Moses would lead the children of Israel Moses would lead to raise objections but God said "Go and I will be with thee." The same can be said of Jeremiah, of Saul of Tarsus and of many others even the Angels of Heaven have no business of their own, it is theirs to do as they are told. "He that willeth to do His will shall know of his doctrine." Now what is His will concerning His servants and Heathen India? What is our duty to those two millions or more of India Baptists of these Maritime Provinces? "Go preach my Gospel saith the Lord." "I am the vine ye are the branches" Look at your fruit trees, where is the fruit? Every bit of it is on the branches none of it on the trunk. The sap, the life in the trunk, our life in Christ. We have no record of salvation to any one except by human responsibility. We have only a little while in which to work, let us be up and doing while it is called to-day. Session closed with prayer by Rev. Isaac Wallace.
