## TUBERCULOSIS.

An Association for the Prevention and Cure of Tuberculosis is very gradually being enrolled. This is very well in its way. The newspapers have printed many articles intended to educate the people as to the danger of infection, some necessary preventive measures, and how to take care of those who are afflicted with the disease. This also may do some good. The creation of a sanatorium for the treatment of tuberculosis patients has been advocated and such an institution is admittedly desirable, however far in the distance it may be.

But practically, beyond talking and writing and subscribing a limited number of dollars nothing has been done and nothing is doing. The rich, well-to-do and intelligent know the dangers of the disease and are presumably taking precautions. They are now in many cases employing the best available treatment and providing care and comfort for their relatives who are stricken. But how about the poor who are afflicted with the same distressing malady?

It is just here that the measures so far undertaken are in danger of utter failure. The poor have not been reached, instructed or helped. Many of them read little, and are ignorant of what they ought to do. Some perchance who know have not the means to apply the needed curative and preventive measures. How many such there are we do not know, but we do know that if tuberculosis is to be stamped out, the poor as well as the rich must be cured, whether black or white. A consumptive Indian may scatter the germs of the disease as effectively as if he were white.

Is it not a case for sanitary missionary work, now, and here in Charlottetown? First to ascertain in what families there are tuberculous patients. The doctors, nurses and church societies could make up a list. With this information at hand these might be visited and told of the dangers and what to do within their power for the care of the sick ones and to prevent others becoming infected. Where necessary, milk, eggs, and nourishing diet and sanitary appliances might be supplied. We believe that it is only in some such way as this, by volunteer missionary work, or by paid trained instructors, that there is any prospect of the needed movement taking effect among the poor where most of the consumptives are.

The Grand Trunk Railway proposes to follow the example of leading American railways and establish its own telephone system to connect all stations on its vast system of rails. It will be entirely distinct from the railway's telegraph system.

There are two unanswerable reasons why the West ought not to complain of the Intercolonial. One is that the Canadian Government has spent more money on the canals, which have never paid anything than on the Intercolonial and the canals have been made free of tolls. The other reason is that the freight traffic on the Intercolonial which has been carried below cost is that on Ontario, Quebec and western products en route to the sea. Those facts ought to stop the complaints.

## GOVERNMENT TELEPHONE SYSTEMS.

The number of governmental and municipal telephone systems in the world is very considerable. Great Britain has a telephone system in connection with the post office and telegraph system, while Glasgow, Portsmouth and a number of cities own and operate local telephone systems. New Zealand owns and operates the long distance telephones in that Colony. Cape Colony and the Transvaal do the same. Ceylon has a Government telephone system and so has the Straits Settlements. In Melbourne, Australia, the telephone is a state affair. In Norway and Denmark the Government owns and operates the long distance lines. Holland and Luxembourg have municipal telephone systems and the latter has one instrument for each 70 of its people, or three times the proportion we have here. Germany and Belgium have state telephone systems and in Russia the long distance lines are wholly owned and operated by the Government. Natal and Tasmania are also among the countries having state-owned telephone systems.

All the people outside of Georgetown will regret that Capt. Finlayson did not succeed in bringing the Minto to this port on Saturday, but due credit must be given for the attempt. As the ice shifts from day to day we shall live in the hope that another effort may be made in the near future which may prove more successful.

The Government is understood to be in receipt of a number of applications for the positions of vendors and prosecutors in Prince County under the Prohibition Act. These appointments are important, and great care is requisite in order to secure the right men. Reliability and loyalty to the law should be considered a prime requisite.

A New Jersey city found its water supply system inadequate to supply the demand. The customers were using water at the rate of 200 gallons per head per day, and most of them thought they could not get along with less. It became necessary either to reduce the consumption or provide an extension of the water works system at great cost. Then the meter plan was tried, measuring the water to each patron and making him pay in proportion to what he used. This reduced the consumption to 75 gallons per head per day, or less than one third of the consumption under the flat rate. The water supply has since been abundant and will be so for years to come although the city is growing rapidly.

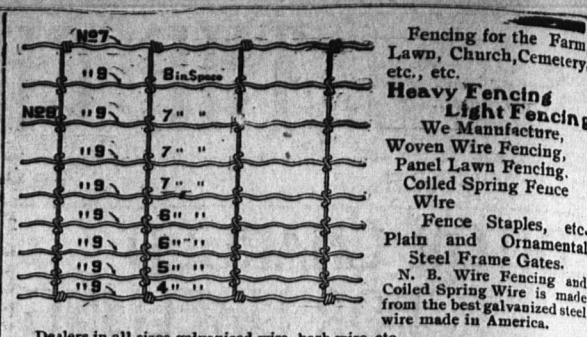
