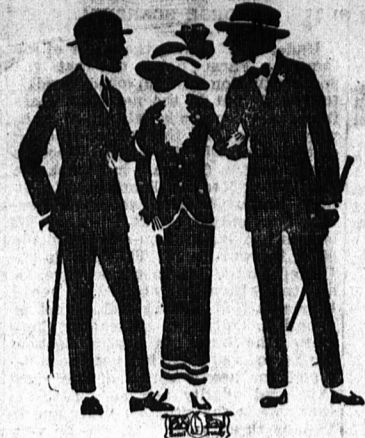

culity. The remedy would be to have tin pails for milking, the udders properly cleaned before milking, (in the bottom of 2-3 of the cans there is a lot of sediment which is contaminated with the droppings of the cow.) This is one of the greatest difficulties in getting good flavored milk. The cans properly cleaned and aired before putting in the milk and milk properly strained and then cooled. To overcome these difficulties a capable man to visit the patrons and have a personal examination of conditions at the farm as lecturing and literature seems to be a failure.

MAKER NO. 9. I think it is an improvement to sterilize the whey tank, that helps in keeping the cans clean, I sometimes find cans with a scum up the side and by taking a pencil I get the real sour whey out of this scum. I always get the ripe milk in such cans.

MAKER NO. 10. The outstanding difficulty is over ripe milk and dirty cans, and the way to overcome that would be clean and cool milk.

MAKER NO. 11. Over ripe and gassy milk, caused by not straining the milk and cooling it and leaving the covers of the cans over night. I would recommend an inspector or inspectors to look after the milk producers until this trouble is overcome. Until milk is delivered in better condition it is impossible to make finest quality of cheese, especially in large factories.

The replies from the eleven makers all agree on the chief difficulty in making finest cheese OVER-RIPE AND GASSY MILK. Who is responsible for this and how is it to be remedied? The cheese makers and boards of directors are responsible. The average patron will follow the course of least resistance and if his milk is a bit off today and gets by at the weight stand, the chances are it will be worse tomorrow.

The boards of directors have got to let it be understood that over ripe and gassy milk will not be taken then it is up to the cheese maker to take a grip of things and see the rule is strictly enforced at the weight stand.

The following places should be posted on every weight stand WORKING IN YOUR OWN INTEREST WE CANNOT ACCEPT OVER RIPE AND GASSY MILK.

The directors should make a canvass of the different routes and induce as many as possible to put up and make some provision for cooling their milk.

Results from cooling milk in Ontario cheese factories.

To illustrate the loss in yield of cheese from over ripe, uncooled milk such as was delivered by too many patrons in the warm weather, let us take one experiment of a series that is being conducted under factory conditions by the Western Ontario instructors in each group.

July 5th.—One vat of milk, 5857 lbs. acidity, .185 per cent; dipped in 1 hour and 45 minutes at 17 per cent acidity made 492 lbs. of green cheese. Lbs. of milk required to make a lb. of cheese, 11.90; 100 lbs. of milk made 8.04 lbs. of cheese.

July 6th.—Same vat. Lbs. milk delivered by same patron, 4517; acidity, .185 per cent; dipped in two hours and 45 minutes at 17 per cent acidity made 385 lbs. of green cheese. Lbs. of milk required to make a lb. of cheese, 11.73; 100 lbs. of milk made 8.52 lbs. of cheese. Fat tests of both vats the same.

This shows a loss of about 6 lbs. of cheese from the over ripe milk. The loss was according to the sanitary condition of the milk.

In one other experiment the milk from 20 patrons was delivered on a certain day at an average temperature of 80 degrees. The milk when in the vat was over ripe and the curd gassy and the cheese were of poor quality. The following day, the milk from the same patrons was delivered at an average temperature of 65 degrees. The average test of fat was only one-tenth per cent higher, but there was a gain of about 14 lbs. of cheese. The curd worked normally and the quality of the cheese was good. It pays to cool the milk from the stand point of both quantity and quality.

Experience at Rapid Valley Cheese Factory, Ontario.

After several discussions on the subject of "cooling milk" at different meetings, the patrons of Rapid Valley factory passed a resolution at their annual meeting that all milk delivered at their factory must be properly cooled to 60 degrees, but as this failed to be carried out by all patrons, 5 of them agreed to cool milk down to

of the battery circuit; it will ruin the insulation.

Don't hold a spark plug wire more than 1/4 inch away from the engine with the current turned on, when testing. There is danger of ruining the spark coil.

Don't throw away a spark plug unless it is broken. A spark plug does not wear out, and the only attention it requires is usually nothing more than grinding.

Don't screw a spark plug on too tight. It may "bake" fast. Graphite, if available, should be used on the threads.

Don't throw away any batteries in Winter until you have tried thawing them out. Often they are only congealed or frozen up.

Don't leave the battery switch closed when the engine is not running.

Don't leave the gasoline turned on when the engine is not running.


Don't attempt to connect more cells of battery in a set than recommended by the maker of the engine. You may overload the spark coil and burn it out.

Don't leave strands of wire sticking out around connections. They may cause a "ground" in the circuit.

Don't attempt to use any method to warm up a carburetor in cold weather that might ignite the gasoline. Cloths that have been wrung out of hot water are the safest means of heating the carburetor if necessary.

Although the gasoline engine is as nearly "foolproof" as it is possible to make such a modern piece of mechanism, nevertheless, troubles arise that are often difficult to remedy. Successful Farming.
