There is at present visiting Charlotte town one of the oldest of the emigrants that left the island in 1848 for California by the ship Fauny. The name of the gentleman referred to is Artemus Davison now residing in New Hampshire. He is accompanied by his brother who lives in Montreal and with whom he has been for some time. Mr. Davison is the son of the late Charles Chipman Davison, one of the most prosperous Charlottetown people fifty years ago who conducted a large blacksmith shop on Lower Queen Street at that time and employed a large number of men. Since Mr. Davison, who had previously studied law with the late Judge Young in the building where the Merchants' Bank now stands, left in 1848, he has never visited his native province and it is needless to say that everything is new to him. In this connection it is interesting to note that of the forty shareholders of the Folly there are but three residing on the island now, viz. John H. Gates, Mr. Davison, and John Or. French River. Duncan McGuigan, Malpeque, also accompanied the party around the Cape.

The Orange Tea and Demonstration held at Loyalist yesterday afternoon was one of the most successful for several years. Although the morning was dark and lowering crowds began to assemble at an early hour, about 250 strong from Charlottetown reaching the grounds at 8.30. From east and west the trains were crowded and those who drive in carriages swelled the number present until it was carefully estimated at 4000. A more orderly crowd is seldom seen together, a fact for which the Order and more particularly the committees in charge should receive an accolade. The tables were of an exceptionally high order, they and the refreshment booths being liberally patronized. The pleasure of the day was augmented by the generous supply of music, furnished by Worth's Band. At 8 o'clock the members of the Order, preceded by the band paraded the grounds after which the crowd congregated around the band stand. Here Mr. McKay of Brace & McKay, Summerside fittingly introduced the speakers. Spirited addresses of much more than ordinary excellence were given by Revs. D. McLean of Lot 43 and A. F. Browne of North River and F. M. Spruille of New Brunswick. Mr. Murdoch McLeod of Charlottetown also spoke briefly. The day throughout was one of unqualified enjoyment and adds another to the list of Orange Tea successes.

The death of a widely known and highly respected farmer took place yesterday morning in the person of John Archibald MacDonald, Esq. Glenaldale, aged 79 years, after an illness of a few weeks. The deceased was a son of Roderick MacDonald, Esq., of Glenaldale, Scotland, who had received Lot 36 in this island for service in the British Army. After the settlement of the Land Question by sale the remaining estate consisted of 325 acres, which still bears the name of Glenaldale. Mr. MacDonald was one of the most progressive farmers in the eastern section of the province and his beautiful farm with its immense barn 290 ft. x 80 feet, one of the largest in Canada, was a great attraction to visiting tourists. There are left to survive him a widow, formerly Miss Mary Ellen Weeks, Afton Road, and family consisting of six sons and three daughters as follows: Frederick in British Columbia; William in Sydney, just arrived home; Donald in Assan, northern part of India where he is an overseer of a tea plantation; Herbert at Amherst, N. S.; John in Sydney, C. B.; Ezeas, a student at St. Francis Xavier College, Antigonish. The daughters are: Mrs. Walsh, and Mrs. (Dr.) Harris; Montreal; and Miss Margaret at home. Sir William C. MacDonald, of Montreal, and Mr. Augustine MacDonald, a retired merchant in New York, are brothers of the deceased.
