SMALL-ARMS AMMUNITION

Military writers estimate that there are at present, about seven million men in the Allied armies. It is a conservative estimate that each man in the trenches taking part in the skirmishes on quiet days fires on the average fifty shots—a total of 75,000,000 rounds. On active days the consumption of munition increases enormously. The number of shots fired from many small arms on some days runs well into the millions.

About a year ago it was stated that there was one machine gun to every ten men at the front. The firing ability of machine guns varies considerably, but five hundred shots a minute is a fair average. Of course, that speed of firing cannot be maintained indefinitely, after a few minutes firing the gun must cool off.

If we estimate that the number of shots fired from machine guns and small arms during a drive is 1,000 for each man, the consumption of small arms ammunition would reach a billion rounds. —Popular Science Monthly

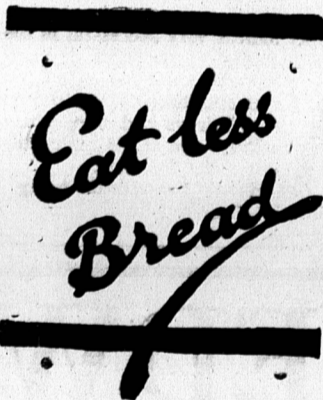


MAIL CONTRACT

—WOUNDED.—Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Daley of Summerside received a message on Monday stating that their son Frank has been admitted to the military hospital Wilmerau Sept. 23rd suffering from a gun shot wound in left thigh. Pte Daley enlisted with the 16th Battalion and on going over to France was transferred to the 26th. This is the second time Pte Daley has been wounded, and has taken part in much fighting—L

—KILLED IN ACTION.—It was with deep regret that Kensington heard that Private John William Somers was posted on the casualty list as killed in action, August 25th, 1918. Private Somers heard his country's call and responded by joining the colors in the now immortal 56th Battalion May 31st 1915, less than a year after the war broke out. He departed for England with his regiment, November 15th 1915 and on June 2nd 1918, crossed over to France, in the 55th. He had his baptism of fire, eight days after he entered the trenches, when the Lieut. of his platoon the late Ralph Rogers was killed. For devotion to duty, he was transferred to the machine gun section of the 18th Western Ontario Battalion, 4th Canadian Infantry, Brigade, with the fighting old fourth Brigade, he went through the following engagements: Somme, Sept. 1916, Vimy Ridge, April 1917, Lens, Aug. 1917, Paschendale, Nov. 1917. He was reported accidentally wounded May 27th 1918, but returned to the front line trenches in July, where with the pluck of a veteran, he remained on duty till he fell on the field of honor, at the early age of 23 years, after being on duty in the front line for 28 months, thus passing away one of the brave old guard a true soldier, popular alike among officers and men, having played a hero's part, he now calmly rests where brave hearts have laid him. Private Somers was a fine specimen of Canadian manhood, a splendid athlete, taking part in all manly sports, excelling in hockey and baseball. He was the only and dearly beloved son of Thomas and Martha Somers. In his sacrifice they have given their all. The sympathy of the people goes out to them in their deep sorrow.

PAPER HORSESHOES

An inventor proposes to make a paper horseshoe that shall for general purposes be the equal of the steel horse shoe, in the following way.

Parchment paper is cut out in horseshoe form and built up to a suitable thickness by the use of a mixture of turpentine, Spanish white, shellac, and linseed oil treated with litharge and the whole is placed under the hydraulic press. This produces very light and uniform pieces, and it is an easy matter to stamp out the nail holes and grooves. Instead of affixing to the horse hoof, they can be applied with an adhesive composition.

Parchment paper is cut into the shape of a horseshoe by use of the press, but the result is not quite so satisfactory. The surface is uneven and slippery, and the shoe would not hold well on the ground.—Tit-bis.
