Despite the fact that a club lead would have given the defenders the first two tricks, South was not

wrong in redoubling. Having bid as high as the slam, and having been doubled by the player not on lead, the redouble was simply good "percentage". Surely, a one-trick set was the worst that could happen, in view of North's bidding and South's own holding.

West tried to find the right lead, considering a diamond heart and a club in turn, but he finally selected the heart queen. When the dummy appeared, South must have been thankful that West had not hit upon a club lead, but South

then proceeded to play so unimaginatively that the opening lead lost its significance. Winning with the heart king, he drew one round of trumps, then discarded a club on the heart ace. He entered his hand with a trump and returned the diamond queen, obviously risking everything on the finesse. East lost no time about winning the trick and laying down the club king for a 400-point penalty.

South overlooked a splendid opportunity. Before drawing any trumps he should have discarded a diamond on the second heart trick, then cashed the diamond ace and ruffed a diamond. Now he could go back to dummy with a trump to ruff another diamond, and repeat that maneuver to ruff out East's last diamond stopper. Dummy's third spade would be the entry to the established fifth diamond and now declarer could get rid of a club!

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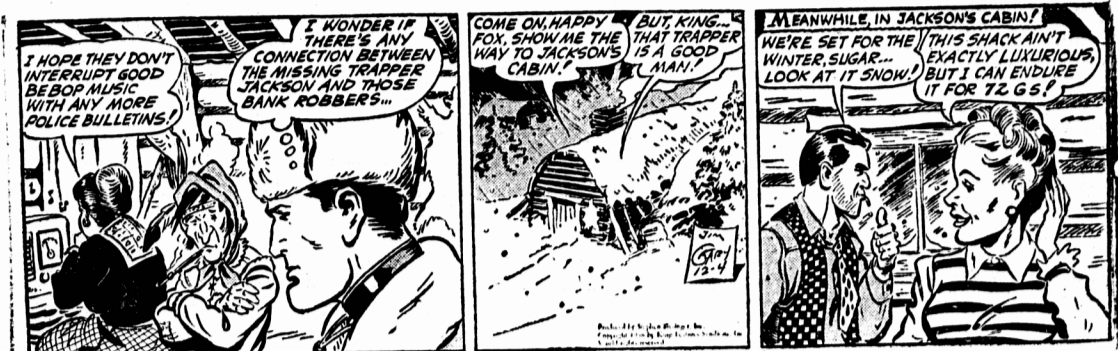

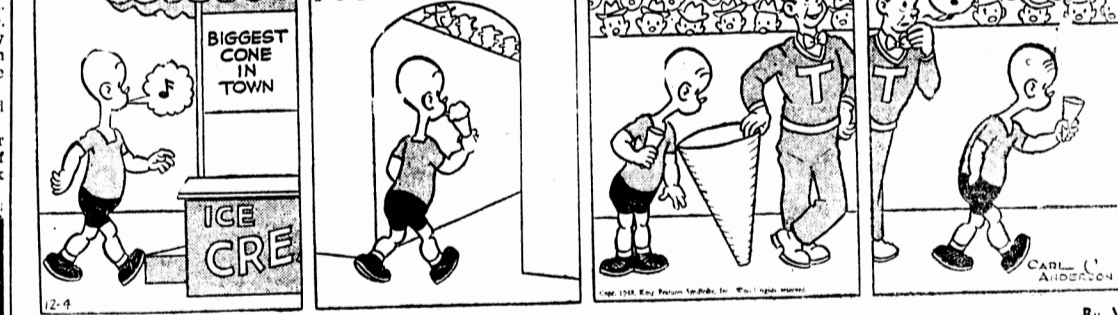
