Discussed, also Knight Commander's Case.

Russian Ambassador and Lord Lansdowne Talk—The Latter's Firm but Conciliatory Attitude.

THE KNIGHT COMMANDER'S CASE.

LONDON, July 26 (Special)—The Cabinet today discussed the sinking of the Knight Commander in eastern waters by Russian cruisers.

THE RED SEA SEIZURES.

Before the meeting the Russian Ambassador had a conversation with Lord Lansdowne re the Russian cruisers and neutral shipping in the Red Sea.

IN A CONCILIATORY SPIRIT.

It is known that negotiations with regard to the Red Sea seizures have been carried out in a conciliatory manner.

THE VOLUNTEER FLEET'S STATUS.

The Associated Press learns however that Lord Lansdowne declared Great Britain could not in view of the treaty of alliance with Japan allow any interpretation of treaties by which vessels could pass through the Dardanelles with a view to their subsequent employment for war purposes.

THE JAP ARMIES ARE CLOSING IN

From South and East on Kuropatkin—Fourteen Hours Fight at Ta Tche Kiao Followed by Russian Retreat—Japs Occupy New Chwang--Their Transports Waiting at Ying Kow.

JAP TRANSPORTS AT YING KOW.

MURDEN, July 26 (Special)—Twenty troop-laden transports, escorted by Japanese cruisers are off the entrance to Liao River at Ying Kow.

MOVING WOUNDED NORTHWARD.

The Empress hospital team passed through Mukden on Monday bearing 314 men wounded in Sunday's fight at Ta Tche Kiao.

RUSSIANS HAD 100 GUNS.

The Russians had about 100 guns in Sunday's action and inflicted serious losses on the Japanese, destroying many of their guns.

RETIRED JAPS, THEN RETIRED.

The Japanese attack on the centre of the Russian position was repulsed but the Russians were ordered to retire on Monday and occupy the heights five miles north of Ta Tche Kiao.

The movement was carried out in good order.

AN ALL DAY BATTLE.

The battle of Ta Tche Kiao lasted 14 hours from six in the morning of Sunday, the Russians having 30,000 men engaged. The Japanese firing line extended fifteen miles.

JAPS ENTER NEW CHWANG.

TREN TSIEN, July 26 (Special)—Lloyd's agent at New Chwang wires that fifty Japanese cavalrymen entered New Chwang today and found the French flag flying from all the Russian buildings. The town is quiet.

CLOSING IN ON HAI CHENG.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 26 (Special)—The Japanese advance against Kuropatkin's armies has begun in earnest, moving up strongly from the south they captured Kaar Pass and moved on towards Hai Cheng. The northern Army, (Kuraki's) is also reported moving but its objective seems also to be Hai Cheng.

RUSSIANS RETIRE FIGHTING.

The fighting at Ta Tche Kiao and southward was progressing several days. The latest reports show that the Russians had not evacuated Ta Tche Kiao but are falling back on their positions, fighting a continuous rear guard action.

THE RUSSIAN LOSS.

The Russian losses are not obtainable but are admitted to amount to several hundred men.

RUSSIANS RETIRE TO HAI CHENG.

Later despatches announce that the Russians have retired to Hai Cheng.

[The above despatches, almost wholly from Russian sources, admit defeat in the battle on Sunday at Ta Tche Kiao, which is at the junction with the railway from New Chwang, the occupation of New Chwang by the Japanese, and their transport fleet awaiting there ready to land troops and supplies at their next base. The Russian forces have retreated up the railway line from the junction to Hai Cheng, some twenty miles. The fortunes of war still favor the Japanese who have so far won in every serious encounter.]

OTTAWA, July 26 (Special)—In the House today Dr. Sproul wanted to know when the House rose at six o'clock was it not the intention not to meet until 9 o'clock permit members to attend Lord Dundonald's farewell?

BETTER ATTEND TO BUSINESS.

RAILWAY AMENDMENTS VOTED DOWN.

On the third reading of the Bill to amend the Railway Act, W. F. McLean, the mover, got an opportunity to divide the House on different railway propositions but his amendments were voted down.

INDICATES AN ELECTION.

The large final supplementary estimates, which total \$11,839,279, of which over seven millions is chargeable to revenue and \$4,774.04 to capital, are held to indicate the almost certainty of a general election before another session will be held.

CH'TOWN FARMERS' MARKET.

There was a fairly large supply at the market yesterday but little produce offering outside. Oats and potatoes remain at last week's quotations.

Eggs for export sold at 12 1/2 cts per doz; from market baskets 14 to 15. Butter from market baskets brought 30c.

There was a large supply of fruit in the markets. Raspberries brought 8 to 10 cts. per qt. blueberries, 8c, gooseberries, 7c, strawberries per box, 10 to 12c, black currants per qt. 10 to 12c, cherries per qt. 25c.

LABOR TROUBLES IN THE STATES

Rapid Transit Tunnel Men in Gotham Strike

Panic Among Packing House Strike Breakers in Chicago—Fall River Mills fail to Resume Work.

NEW YORK TUNNEL STRIKE.

NEW YORK, July 26 (Special)—Nearly twelve hundred men of 2,300 still employed in completing the Rapid Transit Tunnel struck today as the result of a quarrel between the Amalgamated Society of Painters and the Brotherhood of Painters.

STRIKE-BREAKERS CAUSE PANIC.

CHICAGO, July 26 (Special)—Shooting wildly in the darkness a score of panic-stricken strike breakers, hired by Swift & Co., spread consternation through the yards early today.

ARMED FORCE TURNED OUT.

Riot calls were sent to the police and the armed garrison of Packing Town turned out in full force, believing the strikers had organized an attack under cover of the darkness.

COLORADO STRIKE BREAKERS ARRESTED.

Falling to discover any strikers the police arrested the strike breakers, all of them colored.

MILLS COULD NOT BE STARTED.
