**POTATO SPECIALISTS HERE**—Mr. N. Parks, potato specialist, Division of Horticulture, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, and Mr. Eric Davies, who does potato investigation work at the Experimental Farm, Fredericton, N. The plots are for the purpose of testing the qualities of new varieties under various conditions.

**C.N.R. Terminal  
To Handle Freight**

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 25—In connection with the fire which damaged Bonaventure freight terminal in Montreal, temporary facilities have been set up and the handling of less than carload freight has not been seriously affected at the Canadian National Railways terminal. The following statement was issued by Vaughan, chairman and president today following the brief official report issued last evening and giving further details regarding the fire damage and the steps taken to ensure the handling of freight at Montreal without delay. The statement begins:

"At 3:40 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time August 23rd," said Mr. Vaughan, "a fire occurred at the Bonaventure freight terminal of the Canadian National Railways. The fire started with an explosion, the cause of which is under close investigation by railway officials.

"The No. 1 and No. 2 freight houses were completely destroyed, together with their contents, and 130 freight cars, which were on adjoining tracks, were heavily damaged, with their contents either damaged by fire or water."

"The local freight office standing to the east of these freight houses, was seriously damaged, and has been evacuated, the staff being set up in what has been used as the passenger portion of the Bonaventure terminal.

"No. 3 freight house, which is the building adjacent to Notre Dame Street, is still intact and useable, and a long covered platform, which stood between the freight houses which were destroyed and St. James Street, was also unaffected by the fire.

"This provided a nucleus of freight handling facilities, which will be augmented by the use of a considerable portion of the Bridge Street freight house, the St. Henri freight house and a portion of the fruit terminal facilities which lend themselves to the handling of package freight.

"With these facilities, which are being speedily put into shape, the handling of less than carload traffic will not seriously be affected.
