ICELANDERS FOR CANADA.

Northern Sheep Raisers Driven to Emigration by the British Embargo.

Icelandic farmers, deprived of the livelihood they used to gain by breeding sheep for England, are beginning to emigrate to Canada to seek a new home, says the London Mail. For three years the Icelandic sheep-breeders have been suffering from the embargo placed upon the importation of sheep into England from Iceland and Canada. Before 1897 some 70,000 sheep were yearly sent from Iceland to northern English ports, and thence found their way to border fattening lands, and subsequently to the British dinner table. In 1897, owing to the existence of disease among sheep in Canada, the importation of the live animals from Canada and Iceland was forbidden, unless the sheep were killed within fourteen days of arrival. The Icelandic sheep being thin in his native state and fat only after a course of British turnips, therefore fell from grace and for three years the trade with Great Britain has reached only about one-third of what it was before the prohibition. While the home breeder has benefited, the Icelandic breeders and the north country feeder have lost, and, according to Louis Zollner, of Newcastle-on-Tyne, who has been an importer of Icelandic sheep for many years, the Icelanders are innocent sufferers. Mr. Zollner informs the Mail that there was no disease among the Icelandic sheep at the time of the prohibition, but that Iceland was made to suffer for the sins of Canada. Now, seeing no prospect of the prohibition being removed, the Icelanders are seeking fresh pastures in Canada itself.

Messrs. Carvell Bros. are loading the schooner Schaffner Bros. with 12,000 bushels of oats for the West Indies market. She sails whenever the weather permits.

Messrs. Carvell Bros. are completing the loading of the schooner Malebon with 4,000 bushels of potatoes for the West Indies.

The schooner James Semple, is being loaded by Messrs. Carvell Bros. with 4,000 bushels of oats for Pictou market.

The schooner Sadie is receiving a cargo of 2,000 bushels potatoes, shipped by Messrs. Carvell Bros. for the Sydney market.

The steamer Elliott, was expected in port last night. She will be loaded by Messrs. Carvell Bros. with 15,000 bushels oats, 150 bushels of potatoes for Newfoundland market.

The Schr. Daisy Linden is loading with 3,000 bushels of oats and 2,000 bushels of for the Halifax market, shipped by Carvell Bros.

The Schr. St. Joseph is being loaded with 50 tons of hay for St. Pierre. The shipment is being made by Messrs. Carvell Bros.

The City of Ghent was expected in port last night, she will take from Summerside 3,000 bushels of oats for the Halifax market shipped by Messrs. Carvell Bros.

Mr. N. Hattenbury is loading the schr Butler at Georgetown. It is expected that she will be ready to sail on Monday.

The S. S. Tiber sailed yesterday morning at daylight with a general cargo of produce for the Sydney and Newfoundland markets.

The S. S. Greenland is due to-day. This will be last boat of the Dabell Line for the present season.

HOSPITAL CONCERT.

Given in the First Methodist Church Grand Success.

Last night the large auditorium of the First Methodist Church was filled, while a large number were compelled to seek the gallery in order to attend the Organ Recital and Concert. Possibly the object for which the entertainment was held helped to increase the interest and make it the success it was. From beginning to end it was a brilliant series of clever executions and Prof. Watts, as organist and director has received many encomiums of praise for the success attained. His work showed capability and accuracy, especially in peddling and as excellent as was the rendering, it is to be regretted that the organ did not provide a greater range of stops. The reading by Rev. Leo Williams with organ accompaniment was unique, but to follow both was rather taxing on the listener. Miss Dawson evidenced a voice of considerable capability which augurs well for a successful future. The solo by the Rev. Leo Williams and Mrs. Watts were much admired, both vocalists being too well known to need further comment. The three choruses, by the choir of 35 persons, were sung with precision, being perfectly balanced and free from effort which is so painful to an audience. In the memorial number of the program the entire audience arose and remained standing until the conclusion of the "Dead March" from the "Oratorio Saul" and the chorus "No shadows Yonder." The last chorus was enlivened by the clarinet, "cornet and string bass. The music of the number "Gloria Patri" was kindly presented to the choir by Dr. and Mrs. Taylor and it was rendered for the first time in Charlottetown. Capture Thirty Seats At Nomination REVENUE IS BOOMING

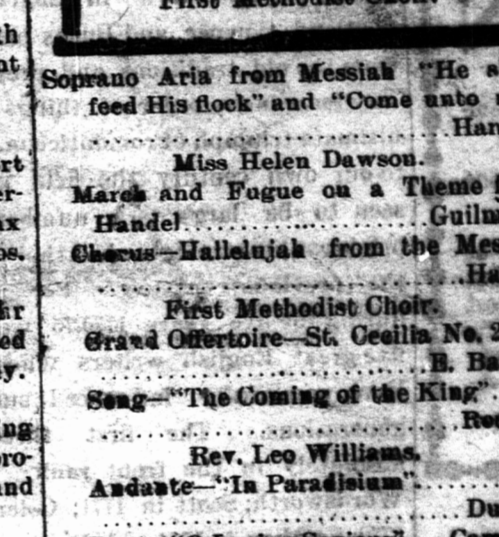
Patriotic Fund—Order for Engines for I. C. R.—Dividends Today.
