farmers for sending foodstuff to Russia.

Loans to Russia in such forms would be scarcely disguised philanthropy, not for the Russians, but for the people making the loans. The Russians cannot get back to the right road to prosperity until they can borrow abroad on their own credit as a nation, and use the money for internal development. Then foreign trade will follow in the only permanently safe path of exchanging goods for goods.

How far Russia is from being able to take this course remains to be seen. Leaders are reluctant to advance money unless there is a reasonable probability that it will be returned. Any government's attitude toward its past loans has a long felt influence. This influence never is permanent; but it lasts a long while, and what the principal reason why Russia may expect difficulties in capitalizing the mere fact of British political recognition of the Soviet.

Henry Ford's Train Kills Three Men

GLENCLEIFF, N. H., Feb. 12.—A special train on the Boston and Maine Railroad bearing Henry Ford homeward from Boston to Detroit late today struck four sportsmen who were walking the track. Three members of the party, brothers, were killed instantly and the fourth seriously injured. The dead are: Charles B. and Robert L. Manning, of Manchester; Francis Manning, of Cambridge, Mass.

The Fleeting Triumph of Treachery

The retirement of Sir Lomer Gouin from the King Government has orphaned the mandarins of Montreal who under the aegis of Lord Atholstan directed the affairs of the Conservative party in Quebec so successfully for the Liberal party that not a solitary Conservative sits in the House of Commons to represent a province that was at one time the sheet-anchor of that party. The debacle of 1921 was the culmination of a series of setbacks starting at the time when the party came under malign influence of Hugh Graham and continuing under the devious, tortuous tactics of Sir Hugh Graham and the machinations of the perfidious Atholstan. His conduct was the wisper of death to the Conservative party in Quebec.

Chronologically the record begins in 1896 and runs:

1900—The Montreal Star management of Sir Charles Tupper's campaign.

1901—The Hugh Graham-David Russell conspiracy.

1908—Graham supported Laurier and the Star was quiescent. Elections took place on Oct. 30th. On November 9th Graham's name appeared in the King's birthday list. He had not long to wait for his wages.

1911—The Star supported the Conservatives. Enter Lord Atholstan.

1917—The Star supported the Unionists.

1921—The Star on the eve of the elections published the roborach that the Conservatives purposed removing the Grand Trunk headquarters from Montreal to Toronto.

In that election those Montreal protectionists fearing that protection was imperilled by the platform of the Liberal party, plus that of the Progressives, decided that as protection was safe under the Conservative party, the politic course was to strengthen the protectionist wing of the Liberal party. My Lord Atholstan's mental processes would inevitably lead him to that course because the protectionist wing of the Liberal party was based on dishonesty to the Protectionist party and betrayal to the Free Trade section of the Liberal party which was strong enough to have its fiscal views adopted by the Liberal convention of 1919. Sir Lomer was their prophet. They lived in his mild, magnificent eye. He was the ocean to the river of their thoughts and interests. Under him the Conservatives could be dished, the Liberal traitors betrayed and the protective policy saved. Today he is the lost leader. What to do? Why nothing but support the Conservative party—on condition—that the Conservatives depose Sir Hon. Arthur Meighen!

Audacious? Yes, impudent? Yes. But my Lord Atholstan is human. He never forgives whom he has wronged and treachery is his stock in-trade. Talleyrand served under three dynasties and took a dozen oaths of allegiance. With less ability Atholstan would rival the record of that brilliant Frenchman. But he cannot go further with the Conservative party. He must stay where he is and knife his present associates. The leadership in Quebec has passed into the hands of an ardent, brilliant, faithful band of men, some of whom attended the Meighen banquet in London. They will have no truck or trade with my Lord Atholstan and the new leadership mandarin who made commerce of the Conservative party in the district of Montreal. They are heart and soul with

HAMILTON, Ont., Feb. 12.—A message was sent to Mrs. Sedgewick by Strachan Johnson, president of the company at Toronto that Huerta, Mexican rebel leader had given orders to the Villa bandit who seized Mr. MacKenzie to release him at once. It is believed that word will come announcing his freedom, as Huerta's Villa's chief and his orders are likely to be promptly acted on.
