SHIP FELT A QUAKE OF THE SEA

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 20.—Capt. J. A. Wayland of the ship Alex Gibson reports to the United States hydrographic office that at 7.05 p. m. on August 8, 1906 when in latitude 36 deg 25 min, longitude 110 deg 6 min, he experienced a tremendously heavy shock of earthquake, lasting about forty seconds, and shaking the ship from stem to stern as if she was bumping over a ledge of rocks. It shook tools out of the racks in the carpenter shop, pots and pans down in the galley, cups and pitchers from hooks in the pantry, and all glasses off the lamps. The crew came running aft, not knowing what was the matter, and the captain thought the yards were coming down. The sea at the time was perfectly smooth, the wind light from the southwest, no land in sight and all sails set, in fine, clear weather.

He had many warm friends both among his fellow employees and in a large circle of acquaintances, all of whom will sincerely mourn his early end. He was 35 years of age and a member of Court Cabot, I. A young widow, his father, mother, two sisters; Miss Tina, Charlottetown, and Annie at home; four brothers Percy N. and Lawrence, Summerside; Lewis and Charles in Western Canada, are left to mourn.
