UNIQUE GOLF PLAYED BY MOONLIGHT

PINEBURST, N. C., January 13.—One of the most novel and unique matches in the history of golf, an 18 hole contest, was played here by moonlight by professionals, Donald Ross, of the local club, and Jack Jolly, of New York. Ross won 5 up and 4 to play, with a medal play score of 88 to 93. Nearly 200 people followed the contest, which lasted over two hours. The match was in regular form and no deviation was made from daylight rules except that four caddies were used, two being stationed on either side of the course in order that they might hear the balls on the long shots and locate them without delay. Not a ball was lost and the professionals were in their usual form, except that they drove short distances to insure accurate direction. A number of golfers are already here for next week's big contests, the third annual mid-winter and the second annual tournament of the Golf Association of advertising interests.
