Hockey As A Career - BY "Tec" Pro. Hockey - As A Career? The purpose of this trifling essay says a writer, is merely to consider hockey as a career; and the question before this house is - "Does professional hockey hold the elements of a desirable career for the young Canadian who is just starting business life?"

The answer as the record shows it, seems to be: yes; and not such an equivocal position is not unusual in similar arguments. You might put it this way - "It depends upon (a) the individual; and (b) the circumstances". One thing is very true. No one but a robust young man in the very best physical condition should ever consider professional hockey, however desirable a stick handler he may be, or however speedy a skater. There is no place in hockey for the weakling. More than any other pastime which is performed before vast audiences of cash customers, hockey trains a man's strength. The average major league career of the ordinary rugged rubber runner is scarcely ten years. Goal keepers last a little longer, by virtue of the fact that theirs is the least physically exacting of all the hockey chores; but ten years of constant body checking, speed skating, sudden turns, cross checking and collision with hard headed bears and heavy human hodies wears down the hockey player in his time. A baseball player's career is longer than a hockey player's by five years. Some of them seem permanently durable, and Ty Cobb is in his twenty-third major league season. There is no big league hockey star still on skates who has had twenty years of continuous service. Batters last much longer than hockey players, if they behave themselves - as few of them do. In baseball and in boxing, the wary brain of an experienced old timer can keep him up among the first rankers long after his feet have begun to break and groan under him; but you can't make this wise old bean answer for the tired old pins when the hockey gods call for sacrifice. This strenuous pastime demands youth, strength, speed and skill. Skill alone will not do. Given an abundance of youth, an unusual strength of physique, the ability to propel himself on skates about twice as fast as the north winds blow down a narrow street in January and more than usual aptitude at propelling a pack with a stick, and your young candidate for the world of affairs can be reasonably certain of a major league hockey career good for ten perhaps for twelve years. At \$75,000 a year this would give him a salary for that period of \$75,000 or \$90,000. That's not a bad prospect; but after old age, as hockey counts old age, overtakes him then what? The answer to this question is the objective to which this report set for himself when his enquiry began a few weeks ago. The record is plain enough. Aspiring candidates must work out the problem for themselves.
