than the Panay incident, virtually demanded Japanese pledges today that China's door would stay open and that all Americans and American interests in China would be free from "unlawful interference."

State Secretary Hull presented Japan a note asking "a formally recorded expression of regret" for the sinking of the gunboat Panay; "complete and comprehensive indemnifications," and "an assurance that definite and specific steps have been taken which will ensure that hereafter American nationals, interests and property in China will not be subjected to attacks by Japanese armed forces or unlawful interference by any Japanese authorities or forces whatsoever."

ALARM GROWS FOR SAFETY OF FOREIGNERS

Hours of Silence Follows Japanese Occupation of China's Capital.

(By Morris J. Harris, Associated Press Foreign Staff)

SHANGHAI, Dec. 15.—(Wednesday)—Alarm grew today for the safety of foreigners in conquered Nanking as hours of silence passed after Japanese occupation of China's capital.

General Chiang Kai-Shek acknowledged the capital had been lost but declared it would not affect China's resistance against Japan. His statement was made in a message to the nation "from somewhere behind the Chinese lines."

"The chief significance of Nanking's fall," the head of the Chinese Government declared, "is the strengthening of China's determination to continue the campaign of resistance because, the seat of Government having been moved elsewhere, Nanking no longer possesses political or military importance."

The situation in the fallen burning city could not be learned because of a breakdown of communications which isolated Nanking except for irregular and fragmentary reports.

Japanese army and navy officials, possessing the only outlets for information, declared they knew nothing of the situation except that their forces were in control.

Tremendous Casualties

Fears for the 18 Americans and a few other foreigners believed still in Nanking were sharpened by unverified accounts of tremendous casualties among Chinese civilians and troops since the attack on the capital proper was launched Dec. 10.

Reports by Japanese fliers of great fires sweeping the city also caused grave apprehension for the foreigners and foreign property.

All Britons were understood to have left the city some days ago but there were some Germans there.

A Japanese spokesman said hostilities within Nanking's walls had ceased. Other meagre reports, however, said remnants of the Chinese defenders were making an almost suicidal effort to delay the conquerors.

Chinese acknowledged that the Japanese had occupied Pukow, terminal city of the railroad to Tientsin and the last venue of overland escape from Nanking. From Pukow, across the Yangtze River from Nanking, they said, Chinese forces were withdrawing to Puchen, the next station, about one mile north.

Japanese, however, said they had no information of military operations beyond Nanking.

Holsen, upriver from Shanghai, between retreating Chinese and Japanese advance forces again imperiled survivors of the sunken United States gunboat Panay, which was bombed and sunk Sunday. Japanese had reported earlier efforts to suspend fighting at Holsen, where the Panay's survivors were taken.

Chinese reports at Hong Kong said Japanese Admiral Osami Nagano, commander of the Japanese combined fleet and a former Japanese secretary, was killed when 15 Chinese bombers sank the battleship Narato near Kiangyin, Nov. 24.

Chinese in Shanghai had reported the 32,720-ton battleship sank by air bombs in the Yangtze river. Japanese had discredited the report. In face of no official denial, however, some foreign circles expressed belief it was true.

Expresses Anxiety Over Trade Treaty

LONDON, Dec. 14.—(CP-Havas)—Sir Patrick Hannon, Conservative member of Parliament, presiding at a meeting of the National Union of Manufacturers today said he could not contemplate "without deep anxiety" any changes in British tariff policy as a result of an Anglo-American trade treaty which would admit an ever-increasing volume of American mass-production goods into the home market.

"Our visible trade balance with the United States," he added, "is unfavorable, and in the present state of industrial organization on both sides of the Atlantic, it is difficult to say, with few exceptions, what substantial concessions the United States can make to us."

To Whom It May Concern
