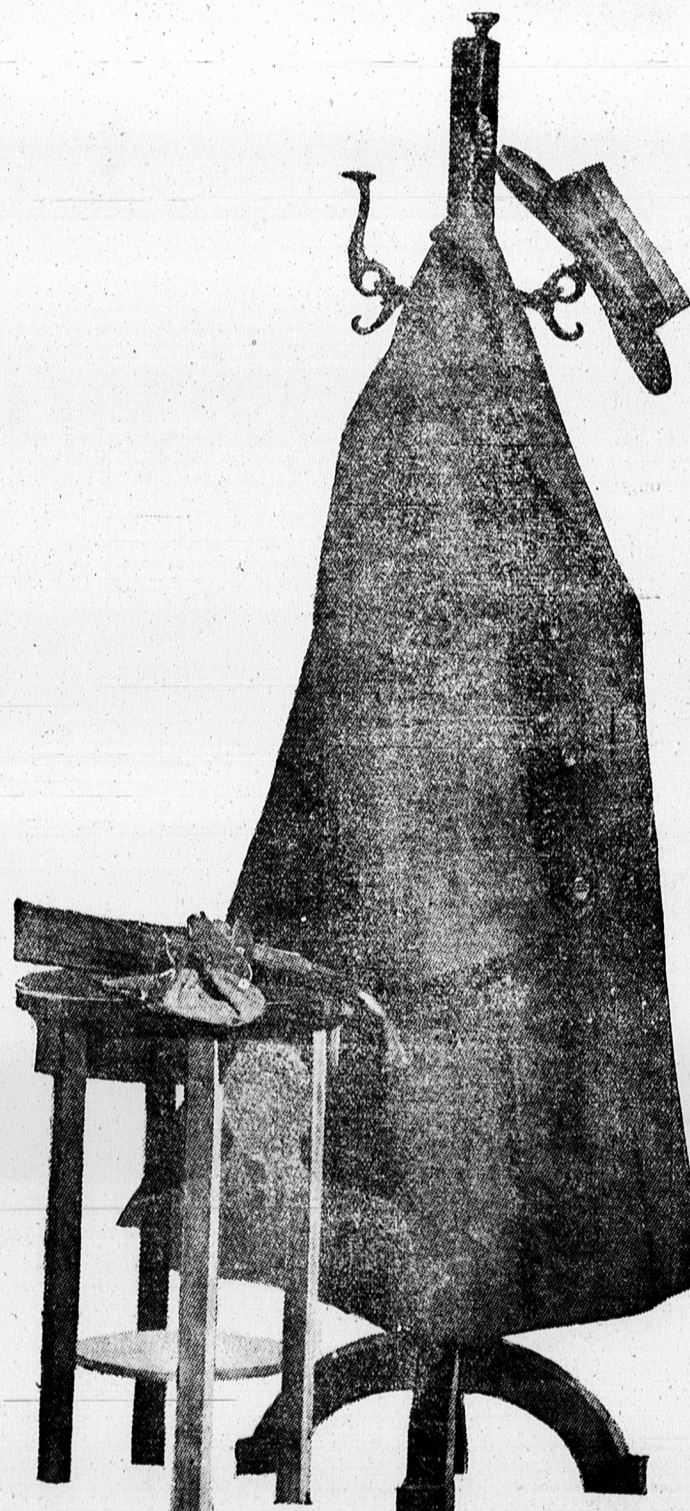

HARRY THAW A DANGEROUS MAN

Liberated He Would Be A Menace To Society.

NEWBURG, N. Y., Oct. 19--It is given out here that Harry Thaw, the slayer of Stanford White, will be released from Matteawan Asylum some time before Christmas.

Dr. Austin Flint, the alienist, of New York, who was connected with the Thaw case from the beginning, four years ago, and who expressed the opinion that Harry K. Thaw was a dangerous paranoiac, when he was told of the despatch from Newburg said that his opinion was unchanged and that Thaw should not be freed now or in the future.

"I have heard of the planning which has for its object the release of Thaw," he said. "Should this plan be accomplished and Thaw regain his freedom, I know of several eminent gentlemen whose lives would not be worth a pinch of snuff. In fact his release would be in the nature of a calamity and would establish a dangerous precedent which other criminal insane persons with money may in time follow."

"I hold, in common with other alienists conversant with Thaw's history that he is an incurable paranoiac, and that his disease is becoming more and more acute with the passage of time. There isn't a patient at Matteawan who comes in contact with Thaw that does not recognize in him a dangerous tyrant who if he had his own way would sacrifice them mercilessly to gain his own ends. The release of Thaw would be highly dangerous to every person connected with his trial, whom he hates with bitterness, secretly nursing hopes of vengeance the while."

Dr. Carlos F. MacDonald, an alienist, who is thoroughly conversant with the Thaw case, declared with emphasis that the release of Thaw would stimulate the homicidal tendencies which have lain dormant within him ever since his incarceration. "I regard Thaw's case as hopeless," he said. "He is a dangerous paranoiac and he does not value human life at all when his passions assert themselves, and this they are bound to do as soon as he regains his liberty and he is privileged to indulge his whims. That he will follow his old course of living once he is freed is as certain as that the sun shines. I have heard that Thaw repeatedly has threatened vengeance upon his fancied enemies in the best three years, and it is absolutely certain that he will endeavor to carry these threats into execution if the opportunity is afforded him."

Dr. Amos T. Baker, formerly assistant superintendent of Matteawan State Hospital, who had daily opportunities for observing the mental condition of Harry K. Thaw, said: "I was with Thaw almost continually from February 1, 1908, when he entered Matteawan, until June 21, 1911, when I resigned my position. I watched him carefully and was in receipt of daily reports regarding him. I assert unhesitatingly that he is a dangerous man whose liberation now would prove a positive menace to society at large."

"I am convinced that despite his assertions that he is of sane mind he would not hesitate to kill me on sight if the opportunity presented itself. I know of others whom he would treat similarly if he had the chance."

Dr. William B. Pritchard, who is an expert on the subject of paranoia, declared the release of Thaw would be a gross miscarriage of justice and a positive menace to society.

Harry K. Thaw is a paranoiac of the most pronounced type and dangerous," he resumed. "He is hopelessly insane, and his release in any circumstances whatever would be a crime. I am sure that freedom after what has happened would aggravate his mental ailment and that within a short time he would be as dangerous as ever. He would regain his release as a popular condemnation of his crime and it would stimulate to action all the perverted passions that animate him, so that within a brief period of time he would be attempting some one else's life."

"If it were possible that he could be cured I would be the last to deprive him of the hope of regaining his liberty. Inasmuch as his cure is impossible and he has exhibited no signs of mental improvement since he was committed to Matteawan Hospital his release would be not only injudicious but would endanger at his hands the lives of many who have in the past four years incurred his bitter enmity."

AT REST.

The sudden death of Stephen Carrier, of Earncliffe, occurred on Tuesday morning last, and was a great shock to the entire community. Mr. Carrier had been enjoying his usual good health all along, and on the day of his death seemed as well and cheerful as ever after finishing some work outside, after his son John had left for the city. Mr. Carrier came into the house, and shortly afterwards Mrs. Carrier came into the kitchen from an adjoining room to find her husband sitting in his arm-chair--dead.

The deceased was one of the noblest and best citizens this country ever produced--his sterling honesty and uprightness of character won for him the respect and esteem of all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance.

The funeral to the Church of England at Cherry Valley took place on Thursday afternoon, and was one of the largest ever seen in the community. The services were conducted by the rector, Rev. Mr. Winter. Four of the pall-bearers were sons-in-law of the deceased: Malcolm McDonald, John McDonald, David and William Sherrin, the other two being John Finlayson and Cyrus Ings.

Great sympathy is felt for Mrs. Carrier in this her awful loss of one of the best husbands God ever blessed a woman with. For theirs was truly an ideal and happy married life--never the shadow of a cloud having come between them in the fifty long years that, hand in hand, they trod life's pathway together.

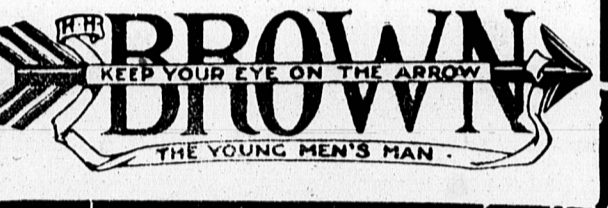
