LATE home-goers on Tuesday night would wonder why the lights in the Rink were lighted at intervals all night. It was simply a new departure and ice was being made at intervals of two hours. All indications point to a larger body of ice at the opening this year than ever before. Thin foundations have been the reason why poor ice has prevailed during former seasons but the foundation this year will insure good ice for the entire winter.

HARVEY MITCHELL, provincial dairy superintendent, left for Fredericton last night. Mr. Mitchell told a Telegraph reporter that butter and cheese are at the present time bringing better prices than he ever knew of before at this time of the season. Butter is bringing twenty-seven cents a pound, and cheese thirteen cents. Mr. Mitchell says that these unusual good prices are caused by the great demand for these articles in the old country. He also said that it was almost impossible to get turkeys at any price. —St. John Telegraph.

LIEUT. Col. Gourdeau, deputy minister of marine and fisheries, has been singularly honored by the French government. He has just been notified that he has been named a Knight of the Legion of Honor. Gourdeau was one of the commissioners to the Paris exposition, and he also gave valuable aid to the crew of a French vessel wrecked on Sable Island. The Legion of Honor was instituted in 1802 by Napoleon. Col. Gourdeau will now be Chevalier Gourdeau. There are only some three or four of them in Canada, and it is therefore regarded as a very high honor.

Craswell, who was to leave shortly for British Columbia. W. Stevenson, John Weeks, R. A. McLeod, to which Mr. Craswell happily replied.

INCOMING vessels from sea report that terrific gales have raged all along the Nova Scotia and Newfoundland coast during the past week greatly endangering the safety of all kinds of craft. The Black Diamond liners Cacouna and Bonavista, Captains McDonald and D. C. Fraser respectively, arrived in port yesterday, from St. John's, Nfld., after the worst passage of the season. The Cacouna was over four days making the trip, which usually takes about thirty-six hours, while the Bonavista was over four days and a half. Both steamers encountered a series of heavy gales, with tremendous seas, and it was only with the best handling that they were able to come through and make the progress they did. The Bonavista had twenty passengers for Sydney, all of whom suffered greatly from seasickness. Both the Cacouna and Bonavista are landing coal at International pier today, the former for Charlottetown and the latter for Halifax. Captain D. C. Fraser the veteran and popular commander of the Bonavista, leaves the steamer on this trip and will spend the winter at his home in Pictou county. He will be succeeded by Capt. F. K. Masters, late pilot on the S. S. Cape Breton—Sydney Record.

TEN million dollars is the amount of increase in the exports of Canadian cheese and butter this year over last year, according to the estimate which appears in the Montreal Gazette, which every year publishes an exhaustive review of the dairy industry. The total value of exports of these two products is estimated at more than thirty million dollars. Exports of cheese from Montreal this season amounted to 2,121,101 boxes, an increase of 6,068 boxes, but a decrease of 174, 831 boxes from 1903. The exports represented in money \$18,029,367, an increase of \$3,534,030 from 1903.

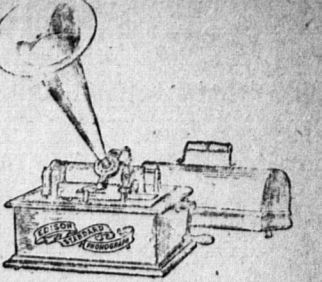
