575 Million Bushels Is Crop Estimate

WINNIPEG, Sept. 7.—The United Grain Growers estimated today an average of 55 bushels to the acre of 28,000,000 acres, a total yield of 575,000,000 bushels for Western Canada. This estimate is based on allowing a four bushel to the acre shrinkage in the Saskatchewan and Alberta crops due to frost damage.

Haze Due to Forest Fire

EDMONTON, Sept. 7.—The haze which extended over the entire country from Long Lac west is due to a great forest fire, according to Major A. E. Godfrey, who with Sergeant-Major Graham, landed here last night in their flight from Ottawa to the Pacific coast. They stopped during the day at Ladder Lake and were informed that far north of that point, there was a tremendous fire some hundred miles in length which has been burning for several days.

Many Shares Rise Rapidly

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—Stock speculation for the advance reached violent proportions on the New York stock exchange today as a result of the unexpectedly small increase of \$5 million in federal reserve brokers loans last week. Nearly a million shares changed hands in the first hour of trading when the ticker again fell behind the market. Montgomery Ward was the sensational feature soaring nearly \$20 a share to a new high record of \$242, but cancelling part of its gain on realising. Sears Roebuck advanced \$8 and Radio, Wright, Aero, Curtis Aero and Purdy barked \$4 to \$4 1/2 a share higher. United States steel common sold above \$157 a share for the first time this year.

SWANSEA, Wales, Sept. 7.—British trade unionism took on an important new directional policy today when the Trade Union Congress after six hours debate voted by 3,075,000 to 566,000, to approve its general council's endorsement of "mondism" as the name applied to a policy advocated by the new Lord Melchett, formerly Sir Alfred Mond, by which a closer co-operation of capital and labor is sought.
