NEWSY NOTES

The Cabbage White Butterfly In 1944 the 'Cabbage White' was superabundant on this Island, hovering over the turnip beds and forcing us to call to mind the big snowflakes we get from the NE. This year they have been as bad in British Columbia and New Zealand seem to be plagued with them all the time.

The Cherry Birch In the 'New Flora of P.E.I.' three trunks in the list of orchards, 'Betula lenta, the Black or Cherry Birch', Francis Bain (1907) does not mention it. John McSwain (1907) includes it in his list of Island plants issued in 1907.

Now the officials of the Dominion Forest Service, express a hope that some of the birch in Canada except in those parts of Quebec and New Brunswick immediately west of the international boundary. It has been reported by lumbermen and others from Nova Scotia that there are reasons to believe that it has been confused with the Yellow Birch occasionally develops specimens with bark somewhat resembling that of this tree (the Black Birch). Another writer thinks that it is the 'taste' of the bark that has caused this confusion.

Here then is a chance for our botanists to distinguish themselves by finding Black Birch on the Island. It will have dark brown smooth bark that never peels or flakes. The inner bark is very aromatic. The twigs are shiny. It has a wintergreen flavor. The leaves are oval, bright green and shining above, pointed at the tip.

There is a little story in defence of our much maligned Garter Snake, which I wish every boy had the opportunity of reading. We have four species of them here, all harmless, and all good mousers!

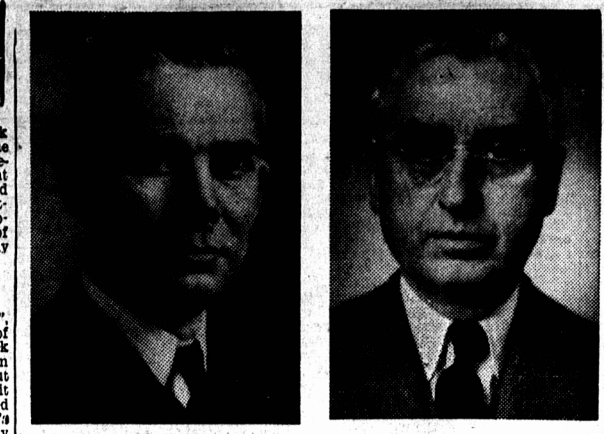
