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

INSECT PESTS INCREASING.—Mr. S. H. Payne of the Entomological Branch, Annapolis Royal, who has been conducting experiments in spraying and dusting at the Experimental Station, for the past two months, left Monday morning on return to Annapolis. During his stay here he reported the presence of abundance of pests including the tussock moth, fall web worm, yellow necks and red humps, all apple feeders and liable to multiply dangerously unless checked. These pests have already done much injury in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. In this province they are apparently only getting underway. The matter should be promptly taken hold of as no doubt they will be much more numerous next year.

John Huntley officially reported admitted four General Hospital, Beasingtke, August 21st. Pte. Huntley enlisted with the original 105th and was afterwards transferred to the fighting 26th. It is sincerely hoped that his wounds will not prove serious.

Battalion, has recently been killed in action. The deceased enlisted in the second draft of the 105th and has been in France for some time. He leaves to mourn a mother, Mrs. Albert Clarke, a wife, and one small son, Richard, one sister, Mrs. Earle Lord, a half-brother Wesley Clarke, employed in the Bank of Nova Scotia, Victoria, and a brother Glenn, in France. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the bereaved family.—V.

LIEUT. MACARTHUR WOUNDED.—Mrs. Chas. MacArthur, Cornwall, received the following telegram yesterday. Sincerely regret to inform mounted rifles officially reported admitted to No. 8 Red Cross Hospital, August 28th. Fractured humerus. This is the second time that this gallant young island officer has been wounded. Lieut. MacArthur enlisted in the C. C. M. R. on March 1st 1915. You Lieut. Chas. W. MacArthur, M.M. He crossed to England in July following. The close of the year 1915 saw him on active service on the Western Front. He was with the Canadians in all the heavy fighting of 1916. It was at the battle of the Somme, October 3rd, 1916, that he was awarded the Military Medal. He returned to the trenches again, was promoted to the rank of Corporal and Sergeant, on the field. After almost two years of continuous fighting his bravery and devotion to duty was further rewarded by him being recommended for a commission. In the fall of 1917 he went to England took his commission and returned to France, where he has been in further fighting until wounded, during the recent offensive. The many friends of Lieut. Chas. MacArthur will sincerely hope that he may soon recover from his wounds.

PUBLICITY SECRETARY.—The St. John Telegraph says Miss Kate H. Miles, of Upper Maugerville, the newly appointed publicity secretary for the Canadian Red Cross Society, Toronto, is in the city and is staying at the Royal Hotel. Miss Miles is interviewing the officials of the provincial branch of the work of the society in New Brunswick. From here she goes to Halifax, Sydney, Charlottetown, Quebec and Montreal.

Mr. Alex McDonald, Glenfinnan, received official notice yesterday that his son Lieut. Leo J. McDonald was wounded. "A gunshot wound necessitating amputation of the right leg." Lieut. McDonald enlisted with the 105th and later recruited a draft for that Battalion which he accompanied to England. He has been in France since May. His many friends while deeply sympathizing with him will hope to hear favorable news of him.

WEDDING BELLS.—The marriage of Egerton R. Reid, formerly of Tryon, to Miss Frances E. Cameron of Victoria, was solemnized in Detroit, Michigan, on Wednesday, August 14, 1918. Rev. C. E. Wakefield, Pastor of the Grand River Ave. Methodist Church performed the ceremony. Mr. Reid is the eldest son of Mr. S. E. Reid of Tryon, and Miss Cameron is the daughter of Mr. Samuel D. Cameron of Victoria.

The death occurred in Jeffrey Hale Hospital, Quebec, on Tuesday last, after a few hours' illness, of Thomas R. Ferguson, Dominion Steamboat Inspector. Mr. Ferguson went to Quebec on official business on Monday last.

Inspector Ferguson, who was about 52 years of age, was born in Picotou County, being a son of the late Mr. Allan Ferguson. He was well known in Prince Edward Island, having been Chief Engineer on the "Stanley" for a number of years and Chief Engineer on the "Earl Grey" when she came out from the Old Country. The deceased was not only a most efficient engineer, but a very genial and companionable man, whose sudden death will be greatly deplored by many in this province and in Nova Scotia. He had been residing at Ottawa since his appointment as Inspector. He leaves to mourn a widow and one son residing in that city. He also leaves two brothers, one of whom John is in Scotland.

Miny in the province will learn with regret of the death of the Rev. John Laird Dawson which was announced in a telegram received in the city yesterday from Halifax.

The late Mr. Dawson was born in Tryon, P. E. I. He preceded Rev. R. G. Fulton as pastor of the First Methodist Church in this city and afterwards had charge of the York circuit which he held up to the time of his demise. He had been in failing health for some time. Last November he suffered a complete breakdown and was ordered an entire rest and change. His wife predeceased him and there are left to mourn his memory, three sons—Kenneth, connected with the Halifax Tram Railway Company; Wilbur, overseas, and Chesley, in the Signal Corps at Halifax. In the passing of Mr. Dawson, one of the leading Methodist ministers in this Conference has gone to his eternal reward. Besides being a preacher of more than ordinary ability, the late Mr. Dawson was the author of "The World's Redemption" a work of recognized literary merit. He was a very sociable man, beloved as a Pastor and admired as a preacher.
