HINTS FOR The Motorist

AVOIDING "ONE SIDED" BRAKING

Don't Do All Your Holding Brake With One Wheel. Does your foot brake act equally upon each rear wheel? This is an important question at all times but especially so in icy weather, when the liability of side slip is great, for unequal brake action tends to produce skidding. The same query may be raised regarding the emergency brake, but not quite so pertinently perhaps. Very likely your brakes are provided with equalizers, that are supposed to divide the braking effect exactly, but it is not safe to depend upon them. They do act to divide the force which is applied by the pedal or lever to the mechanism that operates the bands, but this does not necessarily mean that they divide the braking effect for it may be greasy, faded over or otherwise deficient in "taking hold" power or if the band operating toggles and cams of one brake operate with difficulty, while those of the other operate freely, there may still be a vast difference between the holding power of the two brakes. Even though the same force is applied to them, the only sure way of determining equality of braking action and thus insuring safety, the full retarding action due to the entire rear weight of the car and uniform rear tire wear, is to make periodical tests. This is readily and quickly done as follows: Jack up both ends of the car, block the front wheels, start the engine slowly and put in high gear. Then have someone push the front brake pedal very gently and gradually forward and note the result on the rear wheels. The one which slows down first is the one which is doing the more braking. Perhaps an even better way is to run the engine or put the car in gear, but to have the assistant gradually apply the brake and see which wheel first completely resists turning by hand. This is the one that is doing more of the holding back. The emergency brake requires the same kind of test. When one brake is found decidedly weak, it may be of great service to have the oiling or adjustment of its mechanism, or the replacement of parts which may have become seriously worn.
