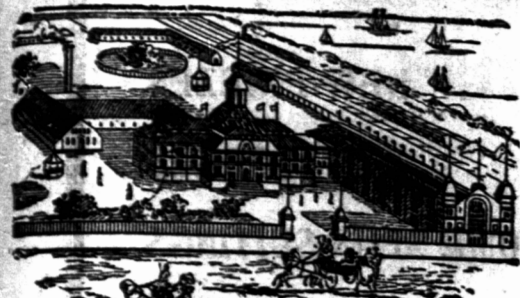


THE ANNUAL EXHIBITION IN ST. JOHN

The Outdoor Attractions are Prominent Features—The Exhibit of Butter and Cheese is an Excellent One—Island Prize Winners.

The exhibition is now in full swing. Judging in the different classes commenced yesterday afternoon, and the officials are making good progress despite the very large number of entries. The outdoor attractions were the feature of the afternoon. What with the horizontal bar performers, the ball game, the man who swallows swords, the corn doctor, and the various sideshows, there was something for the most fastidious. The exhibition certainly appeals to all the people, and they are coming to see it. The turnstiles were kept pretty busy throughout the day, and the Amusement Hall and other buildings were well patronized. Immense amounts of samples have been given away and still there are more. Whether it be oocoo or pickles, fans or calendars, every-



body appears to want a share, and each seeker is rewarded. Some even go back the second time, which may be regarded as a compliment to the quality of the specimens supplied.

The fish exhibit is still one of the star attractions of the main building, and appear to be ended with never-failing interest. The fish occasionally give a little exhibition of their own, but generally they lie quite listlessly watching the passing show.

GOOD CHEESE AND BUTTER.

E. A. Brice of Montreal, judge of the butter and cheese classes, completed his work yesterday. Mr. Brice was one of the judges at the Pan-American, and he said that of thirty-four cheese entries all but five lots would be considered fine at Buffalo. Among the Island Exhibitors of

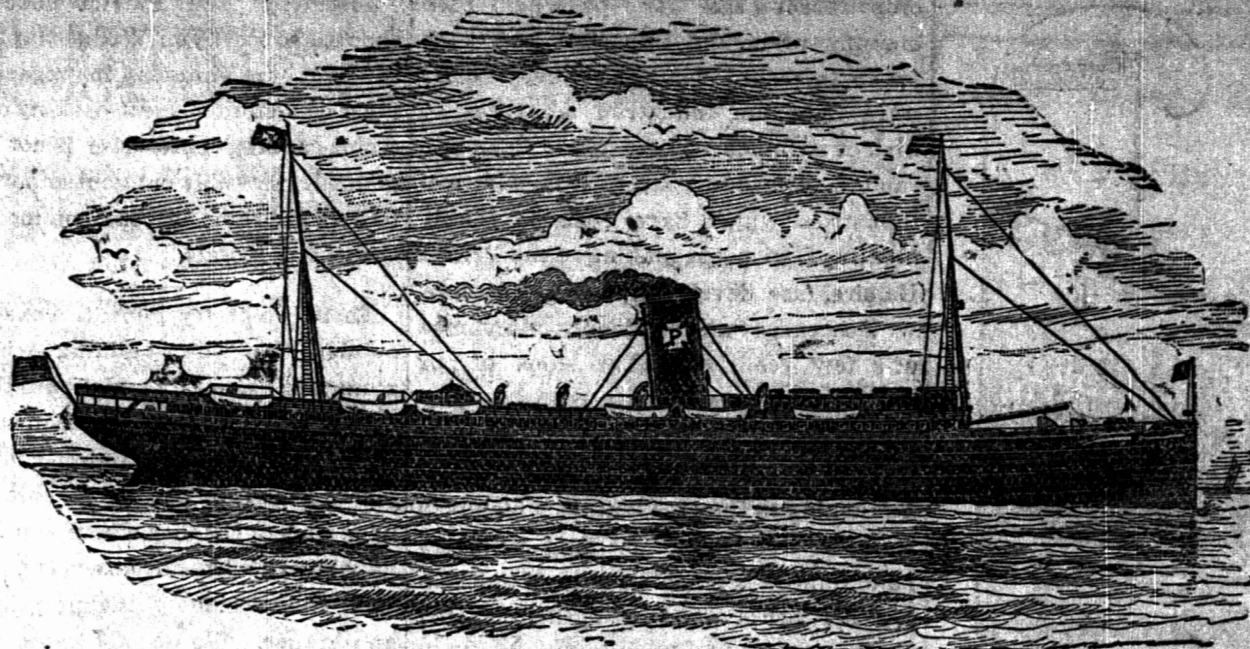
Creamery butter are North Tryon Creamery, Charles Dawson, Tryon, P. E. I. SHEEP AND PIGS.

The exhibits in the stock yard were being judged yesterday. In pigs the Yorkshires and Berkshires predominate and are a particularly fine lot. Among the principal exhibitors is: C. Mann of Winslow Road, P. E. I. The exhibit of sheep is large and good. Prince Edward Island breeders sent over one hundred sheep after the prize.

BY WAY OF EXPERIMENT.

Prof. Robertson of the Maritime Experimental Farm at Nappan, arrived yesterday, and W. S. Blair, who has had charge of the exhibit, left for home at noon. In speaking of the display made here, he said that it represents experiments in variety tests entirely. The farm consists of three hundred and twenty acres, of which about one hundred acres is broken woodland. On this farm, situated at Nappan, these different tests are made for the benefit of the agriculturists. The experiments in grain have been carried on for a number of years and from these conclusions of considerable value have been drawn. They show the necessity of securing varieties known to do well in preference to holding on to seed grown for years and in the natural course of events run out. A variety such as black mesdag is one of the earliest oats with a stiff straw and is especially good for late ground.

The Early Blossom is a white oat and a splendid yielder, but if proper attention is given to the American Banner variety it is not likely that anything better can be found. Experiments have proved that it is better for people to stick to one standard variety rather than take up with every new thing that comes on the market. Among the prize winners in the horse ring are: Span (geldings or mares) in harness—Donald MacMillan, Charlottetown; Royalty, P. E. I., 1st. Sec. 1—Stallion, 4 years old and upward Robt. Hoffel, Summerside, P. E. I.



THE STEAMSHIP HALIFAX.

INCREASING UNEASINESS OVER THE CAPE POLITICS.

Sir Gordon Sprigg a Puppet for Boer Sympathizers—Chamberlain May Yet Have to Suspend Constitutional Government—I. N. Ford Says Depression in British Shipping is Acute.

LONDON, September 1.—Generals Botha De Wet and Delarey returned to London yesterday morning from the continent. The fact that they were accompanied by Mr. Fletcher is regarded as proof that the famous generals hold the same views as the delegates with regard to the situation in South Africa.

CAPE POLITICS.

There is an increasing feeling of uneasiness in Britain over the course of events in Cape Colony, where Sir Gordon Sprigg has become a puppet, managed by Messrs. Merriman and Sauer, and department upon the caprices and prejudices of the Bond ministry which has deserted its own loyalist followers and flung itself into the arms of the Dutch malcontents after making a bargain with them by which the general indemnity bill will be carried at the high cost of the appointment of a colonial commission for investigating the fines and sentences imposed by the military courts. A bitter feeling has been aroused among the loyalists in South Africa over the indifference displayed toward those who fought the battles of the empire and especially over the softness and tenderness shown to the Cape rebels and the sympathizers with Boers. Mr. Chamberlain is charged with being accessory after the event in so condoning treason and discouraging loyalty that hereafter it may be said that the British Government protects those who plot and take up arms against it and neglects those who are faithful in their allegiance to it.

MR. CHAMBERLAIN'S COURSE.

It is predicted that Mr. Chamberlain will reverse his policy in October and suspend constitutional government in Cape Colony when there is clear evidence that the leaders of the Bond are reviving racial passion and undermining British interests. There is also a theory that he is allowing affairs to take their course in Cape Colony in order to have free scope for enlarging the territories in Natal at the expense of the Transvaal and hand-

ing over to it a portion of the Portuguese possessions in East Africa, which are to be purchased and divided with Germany. South Africans here are grievously disappointed over the continuance of the political turmoil, and assert that Mr. Chamberlain is either playing a deep game with masterful recklessness or else has lost his grip and courage.

DEPRESSION IN SHIPBUILDING.

The depression in the ship-building trade is assuming an acute phase. The Weardale Steel Company has stopped and the South Durham Steel & Iron Company which controls about half the output of ship plates in the north of England, is obliged to close one of its works.

THE EUROPEAN CONCERT.

The events of the past week have thrown a new light on the old-time problem of the balance of power. The royal conference in Berlin, with military parades and the exchange of bumpers and compliments, has been without practical result so far as the commercial relations between Germany and Italy are concerned. There is no evidence that Count Von Buelow and Count Prinetti have succeeded in converting the German tariff bill into an instrument for the framing of a new commercial treaty, and unless this can be done the triple alliance cannot be reinvigorated. Warmly as the Sovereigns may embrace each other and loudly as they may pledge eternal friendship, the two allied monarchs have each in turn been visiting the Czar and exchanging vows of good-fellowship, with him. The dynamics of the alliances in Europe are now balanced so scientifically that the benefit of membership is one and the disadvantages of exclusion from the other are equalized. The King of Italy might as well be in both alliances for he is on as good terms with Russia and France as with Germany and Austria, and the German Emperor was not more effusive in vowing unending friendship for poetic and artistic Italy than he had been in pledging his good-will to stern prosaic Russia.

RAPIDS TRANSIT.

LONDON, September 2.—A revolution in cross-Channel passenger traffic is forthcoming. The South-eastern and London Chatham and Dover Railway has ordered for delivery next season a twenty-five knot turbine steamer, 300 feet by 40 feet which it is calculating, will cover the passage from England to France in forty-five minutes. It will be possible with the turbine style of vessel to devote much more space to passenger accommodation. If successful it is expected turbine system will be extended to the Atlantic traffic.

SEVENTY PERSONS DROWNED.

CAPE TOWN, September 2.—It is now estimated that seventy persons were drowned during the storm which swept over Port Elizabeth yesterday. Among the wrecked vessels is the British ship India Perock, which arrived at Algoa Bay August 2 from Portland, Oregon. Some of the crew were saved.

ALDERMAN SLIGHTED.

OTTAWA, September 2.—Some of the city alderman are much offended that they were not admitted to the reserve on Parliament Hill yesterday, on the occasion of a review of the Albany Guards and Hong Kong contingent by his excellency. The reception committee of the council held a meeting this afternoon and passed a resolution condemning the authorities who were responsible for keeping them out of the enclosure.

BRAKEMAN KILLED.

SYDNEY, September 2.—James Wilson, brakeman, at Intercolonial railway yard, was run over by a shunting engine to-night and killed. The engine passed over Wilson's arm and shoulder almost severing them from his body. The deceased was a native of St. John, N. B., and was 25 years of age. He had been an employee of the Steel Company before going to work for the L. C. R., a few months ago.

MARCONI MAKING PROGRESS.

FERRAL, Spain, September 1.—Signor Marconi aboard the Italian cruiser Carlos Alberto, says he is in constant communication with Berlin, as well as with British warships from this station and from Cornwall. He declares that he has solved the problem of maintaining the integrity of individual simultaneous messages.

HUNDREDS DIE BY LANKSLIDE.

CALCUTTA, September 1.—Heavy rains have caused the Rivers Bagmati and Vishnunami to overflow. Serious landslides have resulted and hundreds of persons in the cities of Bhatnagar and Patna have been killed.
