HORSE RACES KEENLY CONTESTED

Yesterday afternoon the first ice races of the season were raced off. The day was fine but the track heavy but despite that, the time made was excellent. Belmont Miller, driven by Mr. Chas. Snow, won the pace in easy fashion, Lillian Patchen being the contender in the first heat and John Biggs in the second and third. The 2.40 trot was much "warmer" and a real lively battle took place in the final heats. Then Cap Creceus and Jellicoe were neck and neck all the way Jellicoe won by an eye lash the last heat. Kitchener won the first two heats in easy style, out footing his two opponents, but in the remaining heats he was unsteady. Owing to the condition of the ice it was thought inadvisable to have the spectators gather round the stand for any length of time in order to take up a collection, but it is hoped that matters will be more favourable towards this end by the next races. Mr. P. S. Brown acted as starter and got the horses off in quick style, while Messrs Hughes Purdy, Thorne and McTague did the judging and timing. Should the weather become colder there will likely be another race Saturday afternoon.

NEW WIRELESS DEVICE TO BE TESTED

MADRID, Jan. 25.—A new device in wireless telegraphy, the invention of Dr. Branais, a Spanish professor, is to be tested on February first, between coast stations of Spain and the United States. The Spanish government has requested the American authorities to send trial messages. The new apparatus is said to increase greatly the effectiveness of wireless transmission beyond a distance of 5,000 kilometers (3,300 miles).

HARASSING THE RETREATING MONTENEGRINS.

ROME, Jan. 25.—Active guerrilla warfare is being waged by the Montenegrin troops on their retreat southward, and particularly in the Tara-hoch mountain, west of Scutari, according to reports received here today.

In advance of the Austrian troops, who are in pursuit, a number of Austrian aeroplanes have been harassing the Montenegrins, flying low and using machine guns against groups of the poorly equipped soldiers of General Martinovitch.
