Free Blood Service Early In December

The Canadian Red Cross free blood transfusion service is expected to commence in Prince Edward Island early in December, stated Dr. J. H. Shaw last evening.

Arrangements are being made with various hospitals which are co-operating with the Red Cross in the service and contracts have to be forwarded to Toronto for ratification.

A supply of blood of associated blood groups is to be sent weekly from Halifax to Dr. Shaw's laboratory in Charlottetown. Hospitals in Charlottetown, Summerside, Alberton, Montague and Souris will be supplied and new blood which is not used within the week will be returned to Halifax to be made into plasma. At the proper temperature plasma may be kept indefinitely.

In this connection the Canadian Red Cross will furnish a free blood test service to determine the R. H. factor in maternity cases.

Notable Anniversary Services Held At Trinity

Yesterday Trinity United Church celebrated the 141st anniversary of the organization of its congregation, the 84th anniversary of the dedication of the present church building, and the 200th anniversary of the death of the great hymn writer, Isaac Watts.

Speaking at the morning service, the Rev. Dr. W.E. Dudley, guest minister of the Church, based his impressive sermon on Ezekiel's vision of dry bones in the valley, bones which God later breathed upon until they became "An Exceeding Great Army."

Dr. Dudley said, in part: "Man never gets so far down in this world that he is beyond recovery. Difficultly, defeat, death itself do not, under God, end man's unconquerable will. At times it seems as though the whole of life would fall apart. Pressing problems like atomic strike at the heart. Some national crisis threatens. Some spiritual black-out shuts out the stars. War sends its truck loads of bones to a thousand obscure valleys. Refugees walk with blistering feet over the face of the earth. Those that remain begin to wonder. The old question comes up again and again—'Will the light ever dawn? Will there ever be a brighter future?'"

Dr. Dudley then spoke of the first settlers in this Province, and how often this same despairing feeling must have gripped their hearts. He said that no ground is fertile for religious faith where the pioneer first sets his foot and heart but still, the missionaries came, and then itinerant ministers, and, slowly but surely, men began to build modest churches in the name of the Christ they served.

Round-The-World Plane Is Wrecked

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Nov. 21—(AP)—The plane piloted by Mrs. Richard A. Morrow-Tait, 24, round-the-world British flier, was wrecked in a forced landing on the highway between Fairbanks and Anchorage today. Mrs. Morrow-Tait and her navigator, Michael Townsend, apparently were uninjured.

OTTAWA, Nov. 21—(CP)—Last week was a busy one for department stores in the Maritimes, but business slackened for stores in Quebec and Saskatchewan, the Bureau of Statistics reported Saturday. Sales were up 11 per cent in the Maritimes compared with the corresponding week a year ago. They were up one per cent in Ontario, three per cent in Manitoba and Alberta. They dropped nine per cent in Quebec and two per cent in Saskatchewan.

Red Drive

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This was the scene of last week's battle. The Defence Ministry did not confirm Nienuang's loss, but said the Communists had been attacking there heavily since Friday night.

The army paper Pease Daily said a Government column under Gen. Li Mi had driven eastward 17 miles from Suchow and was continuing toward Patchi, 13 miles farther east on the Lunghai Railway. It said another Government force under Gen. Huang Po-Tao had crossed the Grand Canal, 40 miles east of Suchow.

In North China, isolated by the Communist operations farther south, Gen. Fu Tso-Yi ordered strict application of martial law in Peiping, Tientsin and the Tang-shan coal-mining area.

ed to find that in the McCollum case the majority opinions pay scant attention to logic, history or accepted norms of interpretation.

"We, therefore, hope and pray that the novel interpretation of the First Amendment recently adopted by the Supreme Court will in due process be revised. To that end we shall peacefully, patiently and perseveringly work."

The first amendment provides that the centre life in God's law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise of religion.

The bishops also said that "secularism", which they described as "failure to centre life in God", has "banned religion from tax-supported education and is now bent on destroying all co-operation between Government and organized religion in the training of our future citizens."

the following morning after the dredge had pulled it into the shoal, smashing the McQueen's radiator. Captain Morrison dropped anchor but it held for only two hours.

The McQueen drifted rudely in a blinding snowstorm for 16 hours. The wind drove it around the top of Manitoulin Island and past the entrance to the harbor of South Bay Mouth.

Two motor launches — Peacock with the Grace II and one owned by Cy Simpson of Tobermory — threw lines to the battered tug but were unable to tow it into harbor through the heavy seas.
