PRISONERS ON LAND IN CANADA

MONTREAL, Que., May 6.—At a meeting of the National Criminal Reform Association, it was announced by the president, Mr. Robt. Bickerdike, that the Canadian Minister of Justice, the Hon. C. J. Doherty, has expressed the intention of his department to extend the employment of prisoners on the land. The association has, for some time past, strongly advocated this as one of its reforms. The president expressed the opinion that the idea of sending a man to jail was to cure rather than punish, and he was positive that no man could be made a better citizen by excluding him from the sunlight. The placing of men on the land was a step in the right direction.

It was also reported that libraries had been established in 21 provincial jails through the action of the association.

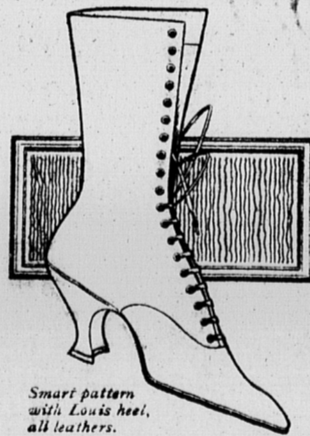
Fashion Authorizes The Tailor-made Shoe for Women

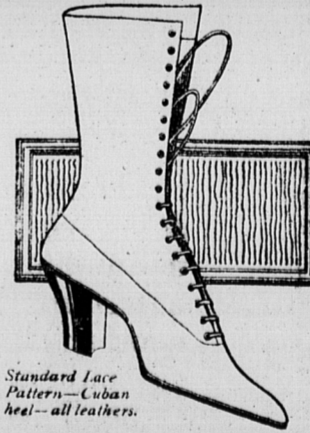

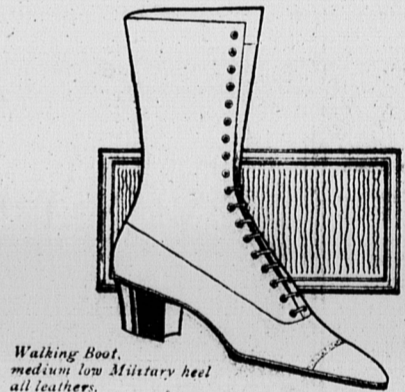
Smart pattern with Louis heel, all leathers.

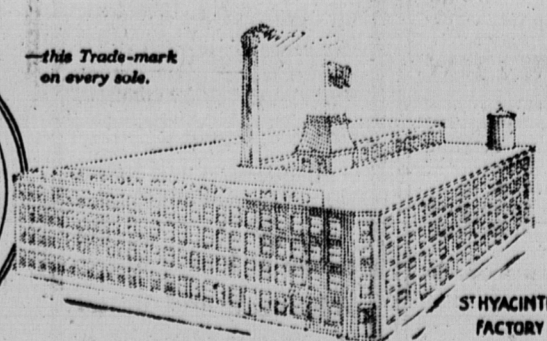
