NATIONAL GUIDE DAY — Charlottetown Girl Guides observed National Guide Day Saturday by canvassing citizens asking them to buy War Savings Stamps and accept orders for War Savings Certificates. At the end of the day their total amounted to \$1200 which is distributed as follows: 2,683 stamps, 535 certificates and bank pledges to the amount of \$28 a month. This patriotic effort on the part of the Guides was carried out in co-operation with the Charlottetown War Savings Committee.

CONDITION IMPROVED — Many friends in Souris and Charlottetown will be pleased to learn of the continued improvement in the condition of Mrs. Greeley Lewis of Souris, who is recovering from a serious operation at the City Hospital. A., of the Franciscan Priests of the Atoneinent, Saratoga Lake, New York, who was called home owing to the serious illness of his mother, left on return to Saratoga Lake Saturday morning, accompanied by his brother, Bowers Lewis of the R.C.A.F., Montreal.

FIRST SNOW OF SEASON — Prince Edward Islanders experienced the first snow of the season yesterday morning as they awoke to find the landscape covered by the white blanket of winter. Lower temperatures accompanied the first heavy flakes of snow which, despite bright sunshine, had not all disappeared by nightfall. This first appearance of old man winter finds many farmers with a quantity of potatoes to harvest and in the fields. Cold weather still prevailed late last night.

OIL SURVEY STILL IN PROGRESS — It is expected that the geophysical survey of the province which is being carried on at present by the Seismograph Survey Corporation of Tulsa, Oklahoma, will finish for this season about the middle of November. The work which commenced in the winter of 1940, was late starting this summer and will have to be continued next year. The survey is being made for the Cities Service Oil Company of New York to determine the suitability of the Island rock structure to the production of oil. Most of the activities of the seismograph crew which is in charge of Mr. G. W. Reid, Tulsa, has been confined to the County of Georgetown areas in the South. Last year the majority of the Hillsborough Bay area was surveyed but this year some "shooting" is being conducted on fine days beneath the water. This is a difficult process and must be done from small boats on days when the water is not too rough.

POPPY CAMPAIGN — Preparations for the annual Poppy Campaign in Charlottetown have been pretty well completed, according to E. M. Bagnall, Chairman of the Poppy Campaign Committee of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion. The Campaign will be opened this year by an address by His Honour Lt. Governor LePage over radio station CFCY on Monday evening October 27th at 6.15 p.m., followed on successive evenings at the same time by addresses by the Premier of the Province, Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, the Mayors of Charlottetown and Summerside, and the President of the Provincial Command of the Canadian Legion, Mr. R. L. Mollison of Summerside. Arrangements are also being made to have speakers visit the different schools later in the Campaign. The Poppy has been immortalized as the emblem of sacrifice and each year at Remembrance Day we are asked to wear this emblem in honour of those who sacrificed their all, in other days, in the same cause for which we are fighting today.

OTTAWA, Oct. 26—(CP)—Shifty Gordie Polier tolled in a losing cause Saturday as Montreal Canadiens asserted a slight edge over Ottawa Senators in an exhibition fixture before 5,388 paying spectators. But the National League entry was under pressure throughout to maintain mastery over its amateur rivals in spotty, sometimes spectacular show that marked Ottawa's first competitive effort of the 1941-42 season. Polier, playman for Tony and Albert Lemay on Senators' first-string line, scored both Ottawa goals and stood out defensively as well. Waging a brisk battle all the way, Coach Gene Coulthart's club looked every bit as powerful as the one he guided to the Q.S.H.L. finals last year. Scored upon in the first five minutes of play the boys in blue came back to notch up two tries and take a 6-5 lead but superior condition and better ball handling finally swung the tide in favor of the S.D.U. them in the second half of the game.
