YEARS OF HATRED INDUCED HURLING OF GERMAN FORCES AGAINST THE BRITISH LINE

Principal Peterson On Return From Europe Sums Up War and Says Its Outcome Will Be Curbing of European Militarism

MONTREAL, Sept. 23.—The Germans have a strange belief regarding the British, which I believe explains why they have so desperately hurled thousands of their soldiers against the British army in front of Paris," said Principal Peterson, of McGill University, last night, on his return from Europe. "They thought we would not fight and now that we have been convinced by the officers and Government authorities that we have broken our word. This has fanned their already strong hatred of everything British, and now their hate is an insensate one, thanks to its being fostered by the Government for the last twenty or thirty years."

Principal Peterson thinks that the United States as a nation has fallen far short of its duty in not protesting against Germany's refusal to meet Sir representatives to arbitrate Serbia's case. Had Germany joined the peace council then, instead of hurriedly sending ultimatums to France and Russia, he thinks the war would easily have been avoided.

"If the peace and arbitration societies do not make their protest, they are not worth a row of pins," he declared emphatically. "What is to come of this war?" he asked.

The answer was a ready one: "The curbing of militarism in Europe, a larger measure of disarmament, a very interesting rearrangement of the map of Europe, and at least one hundred years of peace."

Principal Peterson thinks Canada should go in for more military training than she has. Apart from being a possible force in time of war, men trained in rifle shooting and drilling, such is done at the schools and colleges in New Zealand and at the McGill Officers Training Corps, are greatly benefited in both physique and character.

He thinks Bourassa must surely now see how much Canada is dependent on the British fleet. "If he does not realize it, he is crazy," was the way the principal summed up the situation.

ENORMOUS CASUALTIES

NEW YORK, September 23.—A Petrol cable to the Tribune says: "Specialists here estimate that the extreme limits of Austro-German resources in men for this war do not exceed 6,000,000, about two-thirds being German, and the other third Austrians."

The Germans have lost in France, Belgium and East Prussia, together with their late losses in concert with Austria in Galicia, no fewer than 1,000,000 men.

The Austrians in their conflict with Russia and Serbia have likewise lost 1,000,000 men in killed, wounded and prisoners, the latter being particularly numerous, owing to the readiness of the Slav element, about one-half of the total Austrian armies, to surrender to their fellow Slav.

RUSSIAN VICTORIES

PARIS, Sept. 23.—The battle between the Oise and the Meuse will probably last three or four days longer, says the Temps, in its Military Review today, "but reports indicate that the resistance of the enemy is weakening. Another effort and French Territory will be free of them. It will be hard, however, for us shall have many victims. Our advance between Rheims and Argonne seems to show that the greater part of the German Army is in retreat by way of Belgium. West of the Meuse they are already making extensive defensive works on the Sambre." North West of Sts. Quentin. Its position runs thence by way of Chauny South of Laon to North Rheims. On the Plateau of Caronne severe fighting has been going on for days but there has been no late information as to whether the Germans or Allies hold commanding positions here. The Allies had the Plateau a few days ago but a German official report claim they recaptured it together with the Village of Betheny.

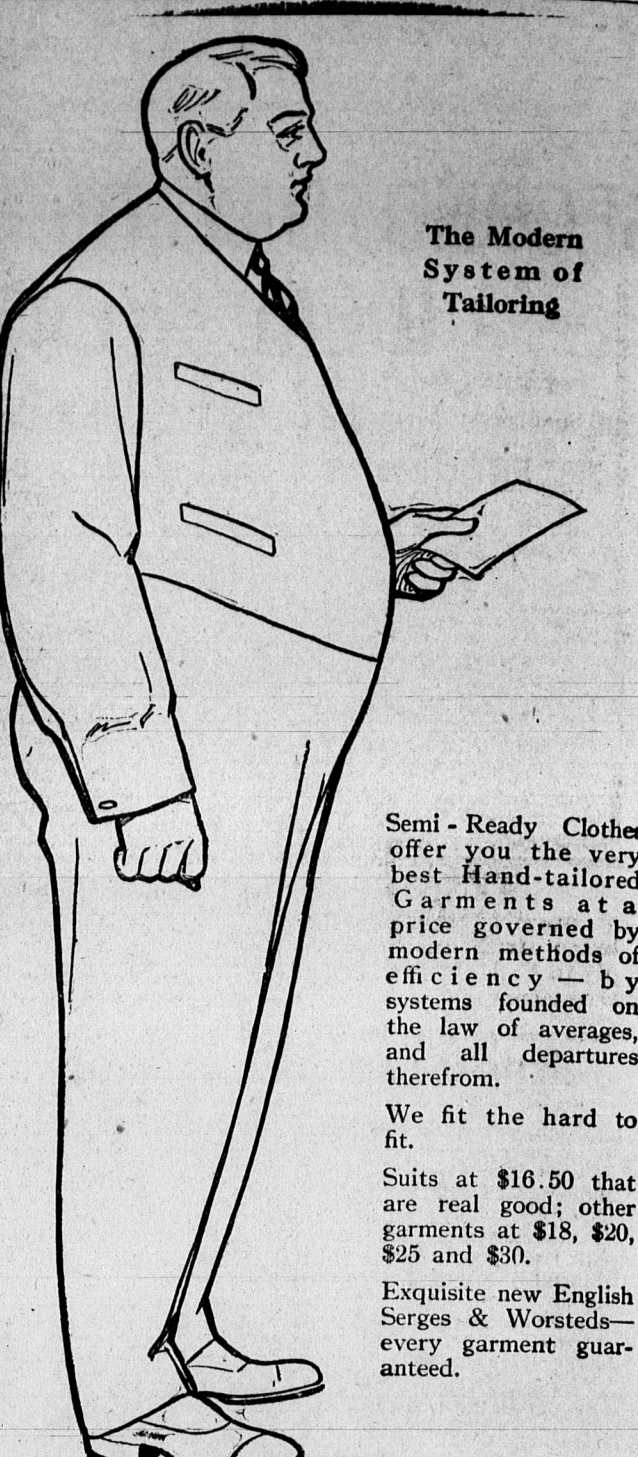
In the centre between Rheims and Souver which the French occupied early in the week there has been more desperate fighting, the Germans taking the offensive and according to French reports, being repulsed. Germans also made an attack on the Woivreux District without success but they again crossed the Lorraine frontier South of Blamont. The French captured prisoners and supplies.

The Russians followed up their successes in Galicia where the third great battle is about to begin, if not already begun by capturing the important fortress of Jaroslau on the River San.

Just North of Przemysl which they are now surrounding, Jaroslau commands the passage of the San River. Its possessions will greatly assist the Russians in their operations against Przemysl where a strong Austro-German force is prepared to offer stubborn resistance in hope of at least delaying the Russian armies which are needed to take the offensive against Germany. Servians report a victory over the Austrians who, thus far, have suffered severely on all sides. This engagement occurred near Kroupanion of the Drina where Austrians attempted to invade Serbia but were driven back. This attack account for the Serbian evacuation of Samlin as the troops were needed to stem the Austrians offensive movement. Servians feel they can now proceed with the invasion of Bosnia and their troops are ordered to march on the town of which the assassination of the Austrian heir apparent, Archduke Francis Ferdinand took place.

Servians and Montengrins are within ten miles of Sarayove and the Austrians have made an attack from the town according to a Rome despatch, but quickly turned back in the face of the opposition of the forces. There is a rumor too that Essade Pasha, former Minister of War, as a result of an agreement with the Servian Government, will lead the Albanian Army into Herzegovina by way of Cattaro.

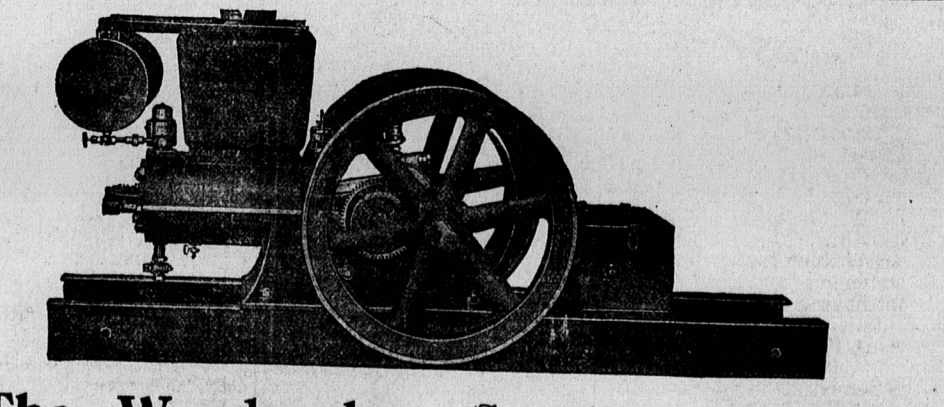
