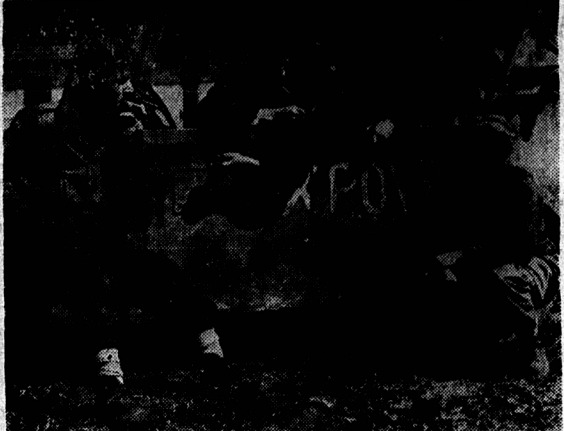

Much Indignation Over Condition Of Rocky Point Wharf

A delegation from the West River district was in the city yesterday seeking Mr. J. Lester Douglas, M.P., and other prominent Liberals to complain about the disgraceful condition of Rocky Point wharf. The wharf, for which \$20,000 was allegedly authorized for repairs last April, has remained without even temporary repairs and is said to be in such a dangerous and as inconvenient to the travelling public.

Residents of the district are particularly incensed at this neglect in view of the assurance carried in the local Liberal press on last April that the wharf was to receive immediate repairs. The statement appeared in the April 16 issue and stated that "Mr. Alex. Matheson, Liberal Representative for the Second Queen's (2) received a telegram from Hon. Cyrus MacMillan on Saturday authorizing \$20,000 for the rebuilding of Rocky Point Wharf. The Engineers' Medal, which was awarded to their son Sgt. Jack MacCarville, Overseas."

Departmental officials stated yesterday that the plans and specifications for a new wharf have been completed and are in Ottawa, and that tenders have been called. The state of the old wharf they attributed to the difficulty of obtaining labor and materials for repair, also to its exposed location and the fact that it was damaged by ice action last spring. It may also be difficult, they concede, to obtain the cross-tied material required for a new wharf, even after the contract is let, and there is no assurance that the new structure will be completed this year. They state that every effort will be made locally to repair the old structure.

Sixteen young ladies were presented with diplomas last night at graduation exercises at St. Mary's Academy, Summerside. The ceremony was held at St. Paul's Church and was attended by many parents and friends of the students. The graduating class was equally divided between those taking a classical course and others taking a commercial course.

NAZIS GUESSED - (Continued from page 1) Good weather and lack of training and equipment made it too hazardous. The German Army would not be making landing in divisions in 10 days, and because the Germans had not the air power to whip both the Royal Air Force and the U.S. Navy.

As for Russia, Jodi said nobody had considered an attack on the Soviet as either desirable or probable until late in 1940 and early in 1941 he reported to Hitler that the Russians were building up their forces against Germany. Hitler, Jodi continued, felt that if he did not attack, he soon would be faced with a Russian invasion of "weaker states" of Europe.

The German Command, Jodi said, disapproved of Hitler's friendship with Mussolini, and didn't want Italy to join in the war. Jodi, Kesselring and Keitel all said Italy was completely unreliable rather than an asset, the intelligence officer reported.

HEADS TORONTO EXCHANGE

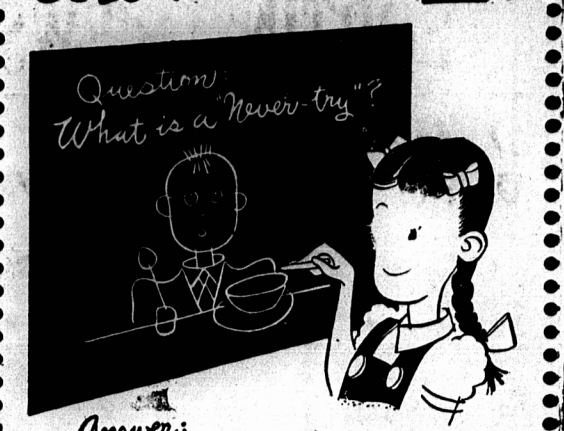

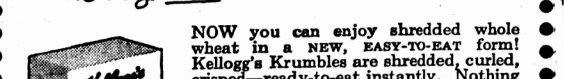
