MARITIME CLUB AIDS SEAMEN

Work accomplished by the Maritime Women's Club of Montreal during the past summer was reviewed by the president of the club, Mrs. G. R. MacLeod, in a short address Thursday night at the Ritz Carlton Hotel, Montreal prior to the recital by the Canadian pianist, Ross Fratt, which was in aid of the Club's "war-chest" fund. Red Cross work, under direction of Mrs. A. D. Ross, resulted in completion of 137 articles of sewing and 109 knitted articles; there were also 40 articles made for the Navy League. One man was finished and five blankets were donated. Twelve ditty bags were filled, woollen garments being supplied by the Red Cross group. One hundred and seventy-five packs of playing cards were sent to Debert and Halifax.

Mrs. MacLeod mentioned a number of money-raising events, by the club and by individual members. From the proceeds of a tea 138 sweaters were bought and sent to the Royal National Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen at Padstow, Cornwall. From a bridge, \$66.50 was devoted to the Merchant Marine, and other events netted \$113 for the Halifax North End Services canteen. The club now has in hand a project from which \$500 has been received up to the present for the Lord Mayor's Fund.—Montreal Ex.
