A two years' contract for the advertising of same was made before the nature of its contents was known, and the management has, after a three months' fight, succeeded in being released from its conditions.

The Guardian Employment Bureau is the general topic of conversation in this city and throughout many parts of the Province. This is not to be wondered at, for so many persons are through it getting just what they want. Those who do not desire to advertise the fee is 25 cents, but no charge is made unless they get what they are looking for. However, by advertising many persons get just what they desire for much less than the above amount.

In Prince Edward Island there is steady progress, says a correspondent in the Christian Guardian. Queen's and King's counties are likely soon to vote on the repeal of the Sooty Act. It is certain that the result will be to place both counties under provisions of a workable prohibition act. In Charlottetown a change almost amounting to a revolution is taking place. In 1877 under a license law there were 729 convictions for drunkenness. In 1901 under prohibition there were 175. And in 1905 they were still further reduced to 91. And during the month of January, 1906, there were only two convictions. And since the first named date, the peace and quiet of the city have been maintained by about half the number of police that were required in the days of license. Neither Halifax nor St. John, with license laws, are contemplating any reduction of policemen. It looks not only as if prohibition does accomplish something but also as if the connection between liquor-selling and drunkenness and crimes of all kinds was very vital.

THIS half yearly examination of the Peterville School, Lot 1, took place on Thursday the 15th inst. About forty-four of the rate payers were present. The several classes were examined by Miss Angelina Theriault, teacher of Leoville school. Miss Rosella Theriault acquitted herself very creditably in Latin, Algebra, Dulcinea McIntyre although small addressed the audience with great complacency with an opening address of welcome and Miss Rosella Theriault the closing address. The practical work is done during the day from 8 o'clock till the process is finished, which requires six hours and is afterwards followed by a lecture on the different subjects pertaining to the best methods of cheese and butter making, milk testing, cares of boilers, engines, separators and plants in general, which leaves room for discussion after the lecture in which all take a lively interest. This helps to bring out any point not covered by the lecture.

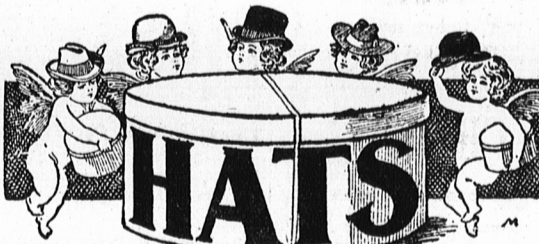
