MUST DROP RATE ON CATTLE SHIPMENT.

WASHINGTON, March 25.—After an investigation lasting for nearly two years the Interstate Commerce Commission today denied to all roads operating throughout the West to Mississippi points and beyond the right to make an advance of 33.1 per cent, in rates on cattle and sheep. This is one of the most important decisions handed down by the Interstate Commerce Commission within the present year. Roads are ordered to cancel such proposed advances by April 15.

FEAR CAPT. SCOTT HAS MET CATASTROPHE.

LONDON, March 26.—While Lieutenant Shackleton and the officials of the Geographical Society insist that there is no cause for alarm, friends of Captain Scott, the Antarctic explorer, are apprehensive that some accident may have happened to him. The arrival at Wellington, New Zealand, of the Japanese exploring expedition in the steamer Kanian Maru and their statement that at no time did they see any trace of the British south polar expedition has caused wonder as to the whereabouts of Scott.

Shackleton and the scientists generally agree that Scott, finding that the Norwegian expedition led him to the "great mail," has decided to remain at the "bottom of the earth" as long as possible, compiling scientific records an exploring generally so that the results of his expedition will be of incalculable benefit to science.

FIFTY RAILROADS REFUSE TO RAISE ENGINEERS' PAY BANDITS FLEE WITH FORTUNE.

NEW YORK, March 25.—Fifty railroads have rejected the demands of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers for an increase in wages of 18.63 per cent per annum. In the replies of the railroads made public here today it is stated that it is impossible to grant the increase.

PARIS, March 25.—Three daring automobile bandits who have been holding the community about this city in a grip of terror for weeks made a raid on the bank of the Societe Generale in Chantilly today, killed two watchmen, dynamited the vaults and escaped in a high-power automobile with loot estimated at several hundred thousand francs.

So daring and well laid were the bandits' plans and with such coolness and nerve were they carried out that the men created but little alarm by their wholesale use of firearms and spilling of blood.

It is believed that the robbers fled to this city and are now in hiding. Every gendarme and policeman and many secret agents of the government are employed in a dragnet search that is being made of every section.
