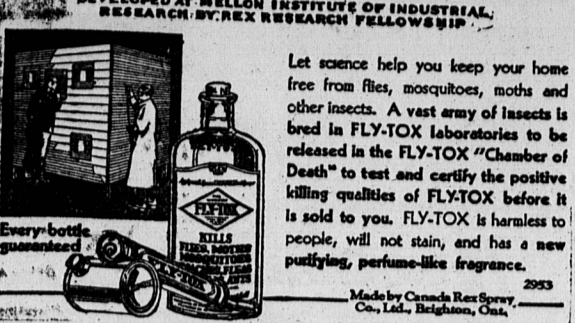

**POTATO INSPECTOR RETURNS**—Mr. S. G. Peppin, seed potato inspector, has returned from a tour through the States of Virginia, Maryland, New Jersey and Long Island. These trips are sponsored by the Departments of Agriculture of the various states visited, and are very popular, especially the Long Island trip, which occupies three days. Their object is to test the results of seed from the various producing centres. Prince Edward Island seed did remarkably well in these tests which led to many enquiries regarding seed stock and particularly as to whether it could be obtained in car-load lots. It was harvesting time in Virginia, but owing to the hot, dry weather, the crop was below the average. The prices were low ranging from \$3 to \$3.25 per barrel, but during the same week owing to the cause just mentioned they strengthened to \$3.75 to \$4. The prospects in all sections visited were for less than average crops; this of course should help prices for the later states and consequently for us. Mr. Peppin was away from June 18th to July 1st; the total number of state and Dominion potato inspectors and officials on tour was about one hundred.

 MONTREAL, Que., July 9.—There were 91 cattle, 449 calves, 736 hogs and 88 sheep and lambs for sale on the two markets.  
 The cattle market was steady. Common to medium cows were sold for \$6 to \$7.50. Bulls were from \$6 to \$7. Canners and cutters \$3.50 to \$4. Calves offered were mostly all veals of medium to good quality and were sold for \$10 to \$12 with one lot of grassers and drinkers at \$8.  
 Lambs were in good demand and brought from \$16 to \$16.50.  
 Sheep were from \$6 to \$7.50.  
 \$14.50 was the standard quotation for hogs of good weight fed and watered flat. On one market a few small lots brought \$14.65. Sows were from \$10.50 to \$11.

## INCREASE IN ASSIGNMENTS IN THE DOMINION

OTTAWA, July 9.—A considerable increase in the number of assignments under the bankruptcy and winding up acts, as reported to the Dominion bureau of statistics was experienced in May, 1929, as compared with May 1928 while the liabilities of the assignors showed a slight increase. Commercial failures numbered 195, as compared with 148 in the same month of the assignors amounting to \$2,294,769 as compared with \$2,523,033 in April 1929, showed a decrease. When compared with \$2,288,116 in May, 1928, a slight increase is noted.

# Sensational Attempt To Burn Court House And Prince County Jail

(The Summerside Journal)

Apparently as a crowning achievement in the wave of lawlessness which has prevailed of late in Summerside and Prince county was the sensational discovery early on Friday morning of an attempt to burn down the Court House and jail.

On that morning the prisoners convicted of criminal offences at the recent session of the Supreme Court were to leave for Dorchester, N. B. to enter upon serving their respective terms in the penitentiary.

The fire was discovered at 5 A. M. by a prisoner, John Grady. He heard the crackling of burning wood and saw the reflection of the flames and proceeded to investigate saw that there was fire in the ceiling above the eastern alleyway at the end of the cell which he occupies is located. He immediately gave the alarm by rapping on the pipes which soon brought the jailor Mr. Antoine Arsenault, and his son, Earle to the scene. They quickly, with the aid of the jailor's wife got buckets of water and also a line of small hose in operation. With the latter from an outside window, Earle Arsenault was able to point a fairly strong stream directly into an opening in the ceiling which evidently had been punched through the laths and plaster by whoever set the fire. After about an hour's strenuous work the blaze was extinguished. But for Grady's prompt action in reporting the blaze, the building would in all probability have been very badly damaged if not totally destroyed.

As it is the walls along the upper hallway are scarred with smoke stains as well as the walls inside the registry office, showing the extent which the fire was gaining. The interior of the building also reeks with the odor caused by burning paper used by the incendiary to start the fire.

The location of the fire was on the south side of the building in the basement ceiling between the plaster and floor above, at a spot in the centre of an alleyway which runs the length of the building. In this alleyway, about the centre, are located the cells which were occupied by the prisoners, John Sonier and John Gallant who were leaving that morning for Dorchester.

A line of heating pipes extend along the wall and if a gate of a cell is left open it is a simple matter for anyone to reach this piping by way of the open cell door or gate. By all the appearances this is evidently what happened. Upon gaining a position on top of this large piping a person so disposed, if possessing an implement of some kind could hack a hole through the plaster and laths, as was apparently done in this case, so that the paper or whatever it was used to start the fire could be stuffed within the aperture. The place where the fire was set was adjacent to the two cells

mentioned, the cell occupied by Grady being at the end of the alleyway some distance from the other two.

If the cells in question had been closed and locked of course it would have been impossible for a prisoner to get out in the alleyway to set a fire or do any harm. The two men in question were however both in cells that had no locks. In fact out of the ten cells on this floor there are only five with locks that are any good. Either the locks are gone altogether or if they are there they are not in working order.

The Grand Jury at the last session of the Supreme Court drew attention to this astonishing state of affairs but nothing whatever was done about it.

The jailor after the blaze was completely extinguished, endeavored to find out who set the fire but each prisoner denied doing it.

Shortly before this he says he heard Sonier and Gallant in conversation. Callant appeared to be scolding the latter, whom he heard replying "I don't care if I get 25 years."

Up to Thursday night the jail contained a total of eighteen prisoners. Three, Gallant, Sonier, and McDonald left Friday morning for Dorchester in charge of Sheriff MacDonald and Constable Keir Mann.

The prisoners on the basement floor as things are at present, have access to the entire lower floor. Besides the prisoners mentioned there were on the floor at the time a prisoner named Wadman and those implicated in the street row with the police.

People living in the vicinity of the jail declare that some of the prisoners created quite an uproar during the late hours of Thursday night and there are rumors that when the prisoners were being taken away in the morning for Dorchester that they were intoxicated. The jailor when asked regarding this, said that there was so much excitement that morning that he did not notice that the men had any liquor or not. He states that he found Sonier during the fire hiding behind a pile of wood in the engine room apparently waiting a chance to make his escape in the excitement. The jailor promptly took him in charge.

S., July 9.—The Maritime Trade Commissioner's office in Toronto is considering the formation of a Maritime co-operative fishermen's agency to foster the marketing of Maritime fish in Ontario and Upper Canada, Trade Commissioner R. W. E. Burnaby told the Sydney Board of Trade today. Mr. Burnaby said one small store in Toronto had sold 3,000 pounds of file's prepared by the new brine freezing method in a single week.
