Prohibition Discussed At L.P.U. Meeting Last Night

In a spirited address before a largely attended meeting held in the Labor Union Hall last night, Dr. T. Cosgrave, Wellington, dealt with the Prohibition question and placed before his hearers some "facts" concerning the recent Plebiscite and the effects of the liquor law as enforced in this province.

In a preliminary remarks Mr. Nicholson stated that the object of the meeting was that people might become fully acquainted with the facts and get together for the purpose of remedying the conditions which now exist under the present prohibition law.

Dr. Cosgrave was then introduced by the chairman and after a few preliminary remarks in which he informed his audience that he was working only for the benefit of his fellowmen, went on to discuss the question of the evening, prohibition.

Dr. Cosgrave then asserted that the liquor obtainable under the law as it now stands was misrepresented, unfit even for a beast. He then referred to the effects of prohibition in Turkey, to the inhabitants of which today are the most degraded and immoral on the face of the earth.

In making reference to the propaganda scattered about the country by prohibition advocates, Dr. Cosgrave pointed to a letter appearing in the press recently, this letter set forth the evils which follow in the wake of liquor and was in the speaker's opinion, nothing but rot and lies.

At the conclusion of Dr. Cosgrave's address a resolution was passed, asking the administration to stay proceedings with regard to the recent plebiscite.

The following form of petition was agreed upon for circulation and presentation to the Legislature. To the Honourable Legislature of the Province of Prince Edward Island, whether or not wise and beer shall P. E. I. do hereby request the pre-erment control.

HUGE COUNTERFEITING SYNDICATE CAUSES TROUBLE

Imitation of Genuine Notes so Successful That British Treasury is Withdrawing Pound and Five Pound Notes From Circulation.

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Feb. 27—The grave situation caused by the huge counterfeiting operations has caused the treasury to issue orders withdrawing the pound notes now in circulation. The post-poning of issuance of new pound notes move is believed to be the result of evidence secured by police that a huge international counterfeiting syndicate is making a remarkably close imitation of the pound and five pound notes.

Eastern Problems And Christianity Subject of Address

Christianity and Mohammedanism was the subject of a very interesting address at Zion Hall last night by Mayor C. Roy Genge. C. B. E. G. de G. who has recently returned from military service in the Near East.

The speaker first gave in outline the origin of Christianity and emphasized the fact that while it had its birth in Palestine and the East, it is today a very small factor in these countries; while on the other hand it has gained ground throughout the western world.

In Palestine also religion played an important part in public affairs. A few fanatical men are trying to make the country a mere Jewish mandate and a national home for Jews, in face of the fact that ninety per cent of the population are free Arabs and Mohammedans and only ten percent Jews.

Major Genge declared that regardless of what the missionary societies may have accomplished, he had never, personally, seen a truly Christianized Hindu or Mohammedan though he had seen many who professed Christianity, to get some small government appointment or for the privilege of learning the English language at the mission school.
