1,300 British Troops Killed by Persians

LONDON, Dec. 16.—Thirteen hundred British troops in Persia have been wiped out by the hostile population, according to a Moscow wireless message reaching here today. The troops, the dispatch says, comprise the garrison of the town of Meshked.

BURGON AT CHICAGO PERFECTS X-RAY

CHICAGO, Dec. 14.—The Western Roentgen Society announced today an important medical discovery by a Chicago surgeon, Dr. B. H. Orndorff, who is the X-ray specialist at the Frances Willard Hospital. Surgeons probing the abdominal regions with the X-ray have up to now been baffled because they could not distinguish precisely the diseased organs. Dr. Orndorff, with the aid of Dr. L. S. Trostler of St. Joseph's Hospital, has perfected a method to surmount the difficulty by filling the abdomen with air or gas with the result that the X-ray picks out unerringly the diseased tissues.

EXTRAVAGANT BUYING Toronto Saturday Night says:

"Those who have made a close study of the exchange situation between this country and the United States are of the opinion that Canadian money may well be under a discount of anywhere from ten to twenty per cent. in the neighboring Republic, and that before very long, unless we check our extravagance by cutting down imports.

AERIAL SERVICE IN LOWER PROVINCES

MONCTON, Dec. 14.—At a joint meeting of members of the City Council and Board of Trade, the proposal to establish an aerial service in the Maritime Provinces was again considered. Capt. Stevenson, Charlottetown, appeared on behalf of the proposed company. The company has \$300,000 to be subscribed, and it is proposed to make it a meritum floatation as far as possible. Captain Stevenson said that an effort will be made to have the three Maritime Provinces at the next sessions of their legislative guarantee a dividend of seven per cent. on stock for the next ten years.

AVIATION CONGRESS TO BE HELD IN CUBA

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Many aviators from the United States are expected to take part in the Pan-American Aviation Congress and exhibition which is to be held in Cuba, February 31 to March 1, next.

Officials here give it as their opinion that this international flying contest and exhibition will do much to stimulate the establishment of regular mail commercial and passenger lines between the United States and Cuba, and with other countries of Central and South America.

There will be several prizes for the aviators making the best non-stop flights between some point in the United States and Havana. The first prize in this class will be 2500 pesos, the second, 1500 pesos, the third, 1000 pesos and the fourth, 500 pesos. Other prizes will be given for flights from Havana to Key West and return. The first prize in this case will be 2000 pesos, the second, 1000 pesos, and the third, 500 pesos. There will be other prizes for flights of less importance.

USES FOR ORIENTAL EMBROIDERIES

Many persons have odds and ends of Japanese and Chinese embroideries for which, dressmaking apart, it is not always easy to find an effective use. Such embroideries are always decorative in the extreme, and practically every scrap may be turned to account. They look particularly well when made up in different ways, in combination with soft colored leathers, whether of the rough or smooth varieties. Thus two panels from the two sides of a mandarin's robe, with its mounted on the two leaves which fold over a fitted writing pad, or the large square panel from the back of the robe may be mounted so as to form the major portion of the cover of a book.

PADEREWISKI TO GO BACK TO PIANO

GENEVA, December 15.—Ignaco Paderewski, the Polish premier, is expected to abandon politics in the near future and return to his home in Switzerland, owing to the condition of his health. Mr. Paderewski, the advices add, will devote himself to music. He has not touched the piano since the war.

Canadian Airman Gets U.S. Position

(Special to The Guardian.) TORONTO, Dec. 16.—A Canadian Major, A. E. McIvor, of the R.C.A.F. has just been appointed commander of the famous Minola Aerodrome at an initial salary of \$10,800 a year.

Major McIvor has a splendid record of services with the flying corps overseas. The American Government recently asked the British Government to name an Imperial air man for the position and the latter suggested Major McIvor who has been offered and accepted it.

ENGLISH GIRL WEDS MAN HER KICK BAVED

Booted Bull Which was Goring Farmer

DUCKFIELD, England, Dec. 1.—Peggy Fisher, the young land-girl who recently saved the life of a young farmer who was being gored by an infuriated bull, is now the wife of the man she rescued. Peggy kicked the bull with such a force on the head that he ceased his attack long enough for the farmer to escape. The Land Distinguished Service bar was awarded to the woman.
