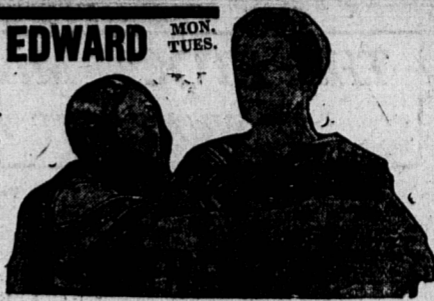

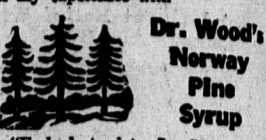

The market demand for silver foxes continues to be very strong, especially for the finest grades in half and full silvery, which are ten per cent stronger since our last report.

Selected blacks, \$50 to \$75. Selected 1-8 silvery, \$58 to \$78. Selected 1-4 to 1-3 silvery, \$120 to \$154.

Selected 1-2 silvery \$150 to \$350. Selected 3-4 silvery, \$175 to \$225. Selected 7-8 to full silvery, \$140 to \$175.

SAP NOW RUNNING IN MARITIME BUSH

FREDERICTON, N. B., Feb. 7.—An indication of the spring-like conditions was observed on the Nashwaakiss stream, a few miles from Fredericton, where a woodsman by actual test found the sap running in the trees as freely as it does usually two months later.

VOLCANO IN ERUPTION IN DUTCH EAST INDIES

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 7.—Krakatoa, which killed more than 35,000 persons in an eruption in 1883, is in violent action again, according to advices received tonight from Batavia, in the Dutch East Indies.

The volcanic island at present is averaging more than 1,000 small eruptions a day, the advices said, hurling ashes and pumice nearly a mile into the air at times. One new crater has been formed about 800 feet in diameter.

Heavy earthquake shocks were recorded at Menado today, Menado is on the Celebes coast. Krakatoa is a small volcanic island in the Sunda Straits, between Java and Sumatra. It has often been in violent eruption.

Calendar Reform Has Advantages

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 6.—The error of the Gregorian Calendar or that used by the world today, amounts to only one day in four the thousand years, said F. D. Henderson, D. L. S., speaking today before the annual convention of the Dominion Land Surveyors, and presenting the case for and against calendar reform.

"Nevertheless, though the present calendar is remarkably accurate and has been in use in England and her colonies for one hundred and seventy-five years and in most European countries since the 16th century, there are very important reasons for considering its reform," stated Mr. Henderson, pointing out the extent to which world opinion has swung in favor of a new calendar.

"The League of Nations has taken the lead in calendar reform," pointed out the speaker, "and on requests for suggestions sent out in 1925, one hundred and fifty replies were received from thirty-three countries.

These were analyzed and arranged and the committee then sent out requests to the various governments of the world to have a committee appointed in each country to study the question further, with a view to later having an international conference where united action might be taken for the simplification of the calendar."

A committee was formed in the United States in April, 1928, and as a result a resolution was introduced in Congress proposing an international conference. "No action has yet been taken in Canada toward the appointment of a committee nor toward an alliance with an international conference on the subject," stated Mr. Henderson, adding that the Pan-American Conference in session at Havana in 1928 favored the proposed reform.
