QUALIFICATION OF VOTERS ON THE REFERENDUM (By open vote not by ballot) Every person, male or female, liable to the payment of School Taxes under the provisions of "The Public Schools Act," is entitled to vote on the Referendum on "The Educational Tax Act."

Under Section 19 of "The Public Schools Act, 1877," and Section 6 of the Amending Act of 1912, every person owning, holding or occupying real property in a school district is liable to pay property tax for school purposes.

And every household in a school district (except a clergyman) is liable to pay Poll Tax for school purposes. Thus every person who is liable to pay school taxes is eligible to vote on the Referendum, and no other.
