Counterfeit Gang Uncovered In U. S.

NEW YORK, Aug. 4—(AP)—Secret Service agents today completed a roundup of seven men and a woman they said were responsible for half the counterfeit money being circulated in the United States.

Captain William Houghton said the group supplied bogus money to clerks and waiters, Kansas City, Cleveland and other cities and to sailors who passed the bills to American tourists abroad.

The arrests climaxed four months of investigation by a west coast secret service agent who came here posing as a fugitive from justice and worked his way into the confidence of the ring, telling them he sent counterfeit money to a girl friend out west to dispose of.

The defendants, all New Yorkers, were booked as: Robert Rosenthal, 26; Anthony Rizzo, 23; Vincenzo Coniglio, alias Jimmy Conti, 37; Frank Pevzalardo, 31; Eleanor Pappalardo, his wife, Alias Eleanor Struckhoff, alias Mickey Hogan, alias Mary Pinto, 34; Edward Wagner, 48; Binco Peretto, 43; Louis Blomco, 41.

Given Three Years For Theft Of Car

EDMUNDSTON, N. B., Aug. 4—Police Magistrate E. J. Hubert this morning imposed sentence upon two young men who had been convicted before him of the theft of a car from Edmundston Motors Limited several weeks ago. Guy Macdonald of Halifax, N. S., was sentenced to two years in the Maritime Penitentiary at Dorchester, and Gilbert Moore of Charlottetown, P. E. I. to three years.

The two broke into a garage and took the car driving with it into the Province of Quebec. Louis Belanger, accountant of the firm with a companion pursued in another car and kept on for one hundred and fifty miles overtaking the two at Riviere Ouelle. They were in possession of the car which had been stolen. Belanger brought the two back with him to Edmundston.

Comparison Of Weather Data July '37 And '36

A record of the weather conditions for July of this year, kept by Mr. W. A. Burns of the experimental station at Charlottetown was issued yesterday and showed a total of 0.79 inches of rain fell during the 31 days. This was in comparison with a total of 4.23 inches last year for the same period. The sun shone for 306.8 hours this year, which represented an increase over 1936 when the island was bathed in the sun's rays for only 228.3 hours. The comparison of miles of wind showed a total of 6,249 last year and 6,394 this July.

The thermometer was consistently higher this July than in 1936 and reached the top point of 87 degrees on the 23rd of the month. The mercury failed to touch 80 last year, while it was over this mark more than 10 times the past month.

The average temperature this year was 68 degrees and last year it was only 64.
