ISLAND SOLDIER ENJOYS BELGIUM LIFE

The following interesting letter has been received by Mr. and Mrs. John McBride, from their son James McBride, who is in the P. P. C. L. E., now fighting in Belgium.

Sept. 1 1916
Dear Parents:—Not having anything to do today I thought I would write you a longer letter and try and tell you about some of the things I have seen in this country; nothing military as I am tired telling you that but I suppose you are tired listening to it.
But before I go any further I must tell you I received the papers you sent. They arrived last night and are very interesting. I am passing the papers over to Serg. McLeod from Sumner's son of Judge McLeod. He told his brother in that never to be forgotten first week in June.
There is quite a lot of wet weather here and the harvest is mostly all in stock yet. The farmers are not able to get it in. They stack most of the grain here something like they do in Western Canada, but do not take great care in putting up the stacks, nothing like they do at home and results is when it rains they get very wet. The grain is so long that when it is cut they have to put two hands in this section have binders of the Massey Harris type. I was at a farm house today and they were thrashing. They had a steam engine which reminded me of Western Canada. The separator was a huge affair like the size of a house and another man did the examination I found it very well. I can not describe it separately but I will do my best. The separator was pulled up between two stacks and the grain was then passed over onto the tops of the machine where a horse with a large knife cut the heads and another man did the feeding. They put the sheaves in crossways. The grain was fairly clean and came out into bags on the side of the machine while the straw came out in the rear and was tied in bundles by a big belt the same as the binders and stacked right by the machine. The idea of tying is stack it up and it comes much drier than if stacked loose.
The people work very hard here for there is no one to do the work except the women and the old men. They have to work very hard from early morning to late at night.
I wish some of our hard worked Canadian women could see others work. They would come to the occasion if they are having a good day. I suppose the women of Scotch Fort will think I am exaggerating. The mills for grinding the grain are a very queer affair they do not take

FEAR EXTINCTION OF THE BELGIANS ATTEMPT BEING MADE TO SAVE SCHOOL CHILDREN FROM DEATH BY STARVATION

LONDON, Sept. 20.—Belgian physicians are practicing extreme measures now to prevent the extinction of the Belgian race, according to a report received here. These physicians have been working among the school children in occupied Belgium and so alarming are the results observed that it is feared that a prolongation of conditions may mean the death of thousands of little ones and

the possibility of extinction to a certain extent.

In all the schools the pupils are weighed and measured every two weeks. A second meal is given to weaker ones. A second meal think of it—you fathers and mothers whose children are well fed—think of these Belgian tots, as innocent of anything connected with the war as your children are, yet they are going to school and to bed day in and day out hungry—dying of starvation.

Some of these children go to school each day without anything to eat, there being nothing in their homes, and for these special provisions are being made as far as possible by the Belgian Relief Committee, Many of the children have

lived for weeks on nothing but stale bread.

These are the conditions that the Belgian Relief Committee is trying to combat! They are asking your help—your little gifts of money to buy Canadian food for these tots. The small sum of two dollars and fifty cents keeps a whole Belgian family from starvation a month. 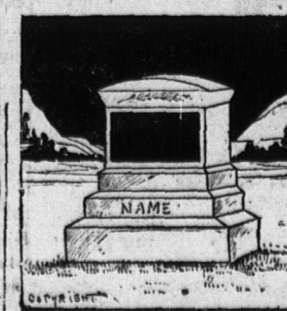
