In view of the time elapsing since Robinson disappeared from Brockton, and of more recent charges pending against him in Montreal, the local authorities will make no attempt to prosecute him at this time.

NEW LINE OF RAILWAY

Anne De Beauport to Murray Bay, a distance of 56 miles, and later on his road will be extended to the mouth of the Saguenay.

COULDN'T DODGE HIS \$50,000 INCOME TAX

LONDON, March 30—M. Bayard Brown, partner in the banking house of Brown, Shipley & Company, who lives in retirement on his yacht at Brightlingsea, was today ordered by the courts to pay a \$50,000 income tax. Brown claimed exemption from the operation of the law, on the ground that his income came from the United States, but the court held that, although he was an American citizen, he was a resident of the United Kingdom.
