FUNERAL AT VERNON RIVER - The funeral of the late Mrs. Charlotte Tweedy, widow of the late Cephas B. Tweedy, was held yesterday afternoon from Vernon River United Church and was very largely attended. Rev. A. S. Weir, pastor of the church, officiated. The service, assisted by Rev. H.E.D. Ashford, D.D., of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, who preached the sermon. The pallbearers were six nephews, Dr. L.W. Shaw, Henry MacLaren, Howard Vickerson, Harry MacGregor, J. Stewart, Malcolm MacLean. Burial was in the church cemetery.

RECEPTION AT THE CHARLOTTETOWN - Approximately 100 local business men, government members and officials were entertained at the Charlottetown Hotel last evening by the management of the Maritime division of Imperial Oil Limited. The reception was held in order that the president of the company, Mr. G. J. Stewart and the group of directors and officials who are travelling with him might have the opportunity of meeting and speaking with men in various branches of the business world, as well as with the representatives of the companies which handle their product. Among those in attendance were Lieut. Governor J. A. Bernard, Premier J. Walter Jones and Hon. A. W. Matheson. The reception was held in the small dining room and in the writing room with refreshments served buffet style.

late Senator Sinclair, Dr. Godfrey, speaking to the report on this committee, paid tribute to the work of the committee on salaries and Mr. S. T. Green. Dr. Godfrey spoke of the tremendous challenge of our day, especially that of Communism, and stated that the true end of all financial projects was the cultivation of the spiritual life. The Board of Home Missions has a great task confronting it in Canada, and no effort must be spared to make the work of the church more effective. Rev. J. W. Howe was appointed Presbytery supply at Wellington, and Rev. W. I. Green is to be interim-moderator of the Murray Harbour charge. The Home Mission committee was authorized to explore the possibility of Eldon being placed on the Orwell-Vernon charge. Presbytery approved that Wellington be given assistance in the modernizing of the manse. Rev. H. E. D. Ashford introduced Dr. Steel to Presbytery. In his report on "The United Churchman" Rev. T. G. Head stated that the circulation of our conference paper stood at 4,500, but more must be done to secure new readers and to prevent lapsed subscriptions. Presbytery resolved that committees on "The United Churchman" be set up in local congregations. Rev. L. M. Murray brought the report of the committee on Education and Students; he stated that, while the outlook for new ministers was a little brighter, the need for more men was still urgent. Mr. Murray gave good reports on all the students from the Island. A resolution urging that members of session promote the work of finding and encouraging suitable men to offer for the ministry was passed. Rev. R. L. Wagner reported for Christian Education, and this committee together with the committee on Evangelism and Social Service was authorized to secure leadership for three schools of evangelism. During the tea-hour, Mr. John A. MacNair gave a fine address on the possibilities and the work of Men's Association. Rev. M. K. Charman gave the report of the committee on Evangelism and Social Service; he also moved the following resolutions, which were adopted; vigorous attention be given to educating people to the value of the Christian Sunday; aggressive evangelism of all kinds to be actively supported; support given to the P. E. I. Temperance Federation and our ministers to present the temperance issue to their people during February; strong opposition to all forms of gambling, with the committee to ask for the repeal of the parliamentary betting Act; that the hearty congratulations of Presbytery be sent to those standing for civic elections on the basis of the statement sponsored by the Charlottetown Board of Trade appearing in the Guardian of Feb. 6 and a copy of this resolution to be sent to the new Mayor and Council.

Resolutions moved by the committee on Church Property included premission for the United Church cemetery to be transferred to a local corporation, for Winsloe to dispose of two horse sheds, and for Borden to proceed with its church building. The Rev. R. L. Wagner asked permission to seek a change of pastoral relations, and the call of Rev. D. W. MacPherson to Murray Harbour-Murray River charge be accepted. The Statistical secretary, Rev. T. G. Head, said that the report of the Statistical committee would be very brief, because seven schedules were not in time to be studied. It was moved that all annual meetings be held as early in January as possible, so that the reports could be forwarded before the end of the month. Rev. D. W. MacPherson urged that each charge do its utmost to secure its full share of the allocation for the Mount Allison campaign, and recommended that students from Mt. A. be invited to visit interested charges during March. The Nominating committee appointed by the chairman is Revs. A. S. Weir, J. R. Skinner, and Mr. S. T. Green. The Rev. P. A. Fitzpatrick was nominated as conference president. The report of the Lay Association stated that 35 services had been held by that group. Presbytery adjourned to meet in Charlottetown at the call of the chairman and secretary.

The meeting opened with the Prayer followed by the minutes of the last meeting, also those of the last annual meeting, both of which were adopted as read. The treasurer, Miss Mabel Adams, read our financial statement covering the years work and it is noted that a satisfactory balance remains on hand after outstanding have been paid. It was moved by Miss Dorothy Keefe and seconded by Miss Dorothy Stewart that an amount of \$3.00 be paid the Auditor. The Post War Convener, Mrs. Hazel Roper, read her report as follows: Madam Regent, and Members, Earl of Hillsboro Chapter I.O.O.F. "During the year 1949-50 the value of our post war service work in money and kind totalled \$423.65. This has been made up of a donation of \$150.00 to the British and European Relief fund, twenty-three layettes to the Royal Hospital for Sick Children, Glasgow, Scotland, and food and used clothing to three English families. "The layettes were sent in two shipments, the first in the summer in cooperation with the Lucy Maud Montgomery Chapter and the second in late December. The first shipment only has been acknowledged. "The food and clothing sent to needy families was donated by our members. Of the three families to whom this was consigned, only one has acknowledged both food and clothing, another has acknowledged food only and no response has been received from the third. "It was moved by Miss Margaret McMillan and seconded by Mrs. E. M. Phillips that this report be adopted as read.

Regent's Report - The Regent, Mrs. A. H. Roper, read her annual report as follows: "Matthew Arnold has said 'If ever the time comes when women work together simply and solely for the benefit of mankind it will be a power such as the world has never known.' "The Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire are striving to do just that - and though our Chapter is a very small link in the great chain of Chapters across the Continent, I am sure each one of us feel privileged and honored to be able to contribute what we can toward such an endeavor. "Our work at the Provincial Sanatorium goes on through summer and winter, two of our members going weekly to distribute books to the patients. Dr. Creelman never fails to write and thank us for our efforts in this field. "In cooperation with the Royal Edwardy, The Abergweit and the Lucy Maud Montgomery Chapters, we held a historical exhibition which proved a great success and we look forward to making this an annual event. "This year we felt that in the past we had rather neglected our welfare work, therefore we put aside a sum of money to be used for the help of needy families in our city. "The annual Tag Day was carried on and netted a neat sum. "Our educational secretary has reported on our work in that department. This work under the very capable leadership of Miss Marjorie Stewart has been far above our average. "Mrs. Hazel Roper has also done a fine work as post war convener. Her report will show what has been accomplished in this field. "In closing I thank you for your trust and good fellowship and for the honor you have done me in asking me to continue still another year as your Regent. "We are entering a new year and my only request is that you continue to be loyal and true to the great principles set down by our Order and ever to live up and work for the real meaning of our Chapter's Motto - For the Public Good."

Record Cold, Snow in Hashemite Jordan - AMMAN, Hashemite Jordan, Feb. 8 - (AP) - Authorities today dealt out blankets and coal to refugees suffering under the worst snow and cold conditions recorded here in modern times. Reports from Jerusalem said 10 refugees were killed when an old house in the ancient quarter of the city collapsed. Two refugees died at Nabulus. Telephone lines on both sides of the Jordan River are out of commission and roads blocked.

BRINY LAKE - Great Salt Lake in the state of Utah is about six times as salty as the ocean.

Increased Totals - The number of voters yesterday was estimated to be considerably higher than those of 1946. There were about 700 more votes cast in the mayoralty contests, approximately 900 more for the councillors and 1427 more for the water commissioners than there were four years ago. The mayoralty was not contested yesterday was Ward Two which is represented by Councillor Lester O'Donnell who was elected by acclamation on Nomination day. 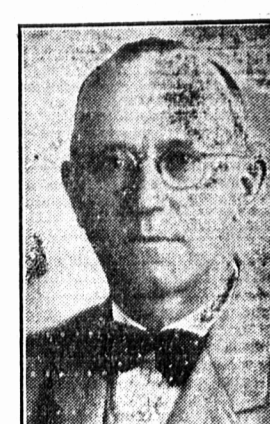

Meeting Of P.E.I. Presbytery Of United Church

The P. E. I. Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met in Charlottetown on Feb. 7, under the chairmanship of the Rev. K. G. Sullivan. The theme of the opening devotions, led by Rev. Dr. H. C. Rice, was "The Cross of Christ."

The agenda was presented by the secretary, the Rev. W. B. Crowe. T. G. Head was appointed assistant secretary and press reporter. The Revs. W. S. Godfrey and J. W. Howe were made corresponding members of Presbytery. A strong committee was set up to prepare for the 25th anniversary of the United Church. Changes in the roll of Presbytery showed that the Revs. J. H. MacCallum and R. E. Vessey had moved out of the bounds of Presbytery and that the Revs. R. L. Bacon and John Douglas had become members of the Presbytery. The secretary was instructed to write letters of sympathy to the Rev. George Ayres and to the Hon. Justice G. J. Tweedy on their recent bereavements. Mr. Austin Bowman was introduced to Presbytery by Rev. Howard Christie. Mr. Bowman spoke of the moving of his work, and related some of his experiences at the Bay's Parliament. Mr. A. J. Matheson pointed out that in a recent issue of a senior quarterly map of Canada had been used in which P. E. I. and Newfoundland were omitted. The secretary was instructed to take up this issue with the Board of Publications. Rev. H. E. D. Ashford presented the report of the Missionary and Maintenance committee, and recommended that each member do his best to secure the 1949 objective.
