The following is copied from the Maritime Merchant: "We have three steamers a week out of Boston for Halifax and ports to the East," said Mr. H. L. Chipman, the manager of the Plant Line. "And I am glad to say they have been filled with passengers on every outward trip this month. Not for several years," continued Mr. Chipman, "has there been anything like the present travel to the provinces, not only by our line, but by all the others having a Maritime Provinces connection. Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton are the popular rendezvous of those coming by the Plant Line. They seem to want to get away as far as possible from the hum and bustle of a city life, and find some quiet spot in the country where they can do a little fishing and boating, and incidentally acquire a good coat of sunburn. Another thing I notice this year is that we are getting a better class of people, people who have a well-to-do aspect, and instead of being merely, as we call them, 'trippers,' are coming along to stay from two to four or six weeks. The stay of these people in Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton is going to put a good deal of extra money in circulation, which, in its turn, will benefit trade among the Halifax and St. John distributing houses."
