The lecturer described his trip, the climate, amusements on board ship the natives and their dress, weeks of living, etc. Having spent four weeks in South Africa, the lecturer was in a position to say a good deal along this line. In his opinion "Durban is the prettiest place he visited, and but for the dust nuisance would be a nice place in which to live." In Johannesburg recently \$100,000 was paid for two building lots and houses of 5 to 7 rooms rent for \$75 a month. The lecturer was introduced by Professor Shaw, who remarked that the Transvaal was now doubly interesting to James congregation since not only their Pastor but members of some of the families had gone to the front. A hearty and unanimous vote of thanks was moved by Mr. T. C. James and duly presented. Several views including our Canadian Contingent, Major Weeks and Rev. T. F. Fullerton were thrown on the canvas. THE market yesterday was largely attended. There was a slight advance in potatoes and 20 cents was realized. Pork was plenty and a quantity exchanged hands at 44 to 48. Hay was selling at 35 to 40 cents cwt. Fresh butter 20c, eggs 20c. There was an exceptionally large supply of fowl. Geese sold for 60c to 70 cents.

ON Monday evening last, the members of the League of the Cross organized a Mock Parliament. Last winter the meetings were made very interesting by a course of debates, but this winter the members thought a change would be in order, with the above results. The business on Monday night was principally getting everything in readiness. The address of the Governor was read and it was quite a lengthy description of the progress of the Island during the past year. The South African war was touched upon, also the cheese and butter industry of the Island. On the whole the address was well written and equally as well delivered. A commi to be appointed to draft a reply for the next session which will be on next Monday night. The Clerk, etc. was also appointed, and by all appearances there is going to be some lively scenes in the house during the session. This is an excellent way of spending an evening and it is to be hoped the boys will take advantage of it. There was quite a large meeting on Monday evening and several new members were enrolled.
