WHO MURDERED R. T. MITCHELL?
 BOSTON, April 10.—The result of the hearing in the case of the death of Richard F. Mitchell in the insane hospital at Pierce farm is the holding for action by the grand jury of the two attendants implicated.
 This action assures the thorough and impartial investigation of an affair which has a very grave significance. Mitchell was unquestionably killed. The autopsy performed by Dr. McDonald shows this. His breast bone and ribs were crushed, his lung collapsed, his body covered in many places.
 Who murdered this man? He did not kill himself. And when it is determined who were the murderers, there remains the question of the authority under which such a crime was possible in an institution of the city of Boston.

MEETING OF DIRECTORS
 YARMOUTH, April 10.—The directors of the New Burrell Johnson Iron company held a meeting yesterday afternoon and made plans in a tentative way for the rebuilding of the works recently destroyed by fire on a much larger scale than formerly. A petition, signed by the leading business men of this town, was submitted to them and is directed to the town council asking that body to favorably consider any requests for concessions which may be made by the company. The directors decided to seek authority to increase the capital stock of the company and to endeavor to dispose of the new issue at once. The money raised by this means will be applied to the following purposes:—the erection of a new boiler shop, the construction of a machine shop to be equipped with the most modern machinery, and the installation of a plant for the carrying on of the steel shipbuilding industry on an extensive scale. The buildings will probably be of brick.
 It was decided to ask the town of Yarmouth for the following concessions:—First, that the assessment of the property of the company be placed for the next twenty years at \$20,000; second, that the company shall receive its water supply from the town free of charge for the period of twenty years; third, that the town shall continue to lease to the company the portion of Porter street west of Water street now used by the company as the site for the construction of the steel tug for the government at the present rental of \$5 per year. The wishes of the company were incorporated today in a letter to the mayor and town council who will consider the matter at once.

TWELVE KILLED
 MARSEILLES, April 10.—The French tank Jules Henry Captain Escotter, engaged in the oil trade between Philadelphia and Cette, blew up this morning, and was practically totally wrecked. Twelve members of her crew were killed and many were wounded. The bark arrived at Cette on March 22 from Philadelphia.
 The Jules Henry is a modern tanker, built at Havre for carrying petroleum in bulk, in 1900, by Forges and the Company de Mediterranee, for A. Vimont & Co. She was a large vessel of 2,088 tons gross, 250 feet long, 40 feet beam and 23.5 feet deep. The crew of the bark are probably all Frenchmen. Nothing is known here concerning them, but shipping men say that as a rule foreign vessels in the oil trade carry crews shipped abroad.
 The Jules Henry sailed from here for Cette on February 18, loaded with 85,813 gallons of crude petroleum valued at \$72,867. As the vessel arrived at its destination on March 22, it is believed here, that all of her cargo had been discharged, and that the explosion was caused by a light coming in contact with fumes of the oil remaining in the tanks.
 A representative of the Veritas agency accompanied by the second officer, was inspecting the vessel at the time she blew up. In the course of their work the two men entered the tank hold. Immediately after there was a tremendous explosion. The entire deck of the bark was lifted and the forward portion of the ship was wrenched off. Twenty men of the crew were at work painting and repairing. They were all blown into the air.
 Great sheets of fire shot up from the vessel, and in a few seconds she was enveloped in flames. Prompt aid came from neighboring ships in the harbor, but it was impossible for the sailboats to get close to the burning vessel. Six burned and mutilated bodies have been recovered from the floating wreckage.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.
 ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may be considered a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made by any Agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.
 Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
 In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section of one side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties must reside six months in each of 3 years from date of homestead entry, including the time required to earn homestead patent and cultivate fifty acres at least.
 A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emptive entry may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$50.00.
